Starting at 12:30, the Riversides and Red Sox got into action to decide their second-round 1-to-1 tie played last Sunday. Frye for the Sox and Schmutte for the Riversides were again named for mound duty, and another pretty hurling duel was staged. Schmutte fanning fifth batsmen and the veteran Frye turning back twelve. The hits were even—five apiece—but a little steadiness of the Red Sox infield decided the score, 3 to 1 in favor of the Riversides.

Riversides Lose
The Em-Roe No. 1 crew then hooked up with the Riversides in the North-west Siders' second game of the day, which went to an 8-to-5 victory for the Em-Roes.
