

U. S. CITIZENSHIP SOUGHT BY 121 ALIEN NATIONALS

Final Hearing Will Be Held in
Superior Court Sept. 28
and 29.

17 COUNTRIES REPRESENTED

Germany, Ireland and Russia
Have Largest Lists of
Petitioners.

Final hearings in naturalization of
121 citizens of foreign countries will
be held before Judge W. W. Thornton
in the Marion County Superior Court,
Room 1, Sept. 28 and 29.

Seventeen countries are represented
by the applicants for full citizenship
in the United States. Germany heads
the list with thirty-seven and Ireland
is second with twenty-three, Russians
applying total seventeen.
