

SENATOR WATSON DEFENDS TARIFF IN FIRST SPEECH

Opening Address of Campaign
Made at Courthouse in
Greenfield.

GREENFIELD, Ind., Sept. 28.—
Senator James E. Watson opened his
campaign in Indiana with a speech
here last night before a large audi-
ence at the Hancock County court-
house, in which he defended the re-
cord of the present national Admin-
istration. He was introduced by Will
Hough.
"I stand unqualifiedly in favor of
Albert J. Beveridge's candidacy for
Senator," Watson declared.
"President Harding has two more
years to serve. Give him a Republican
Congress so he can go ahead with
those policies now in effect," he said.
"If at the end of two years you're tired
of us, kick us out altogether."
Tariff Discussed
Senator Watson in most of his ad-
dress confined himself to defense of
the tariff law recently passed by Con-
gress.
"In 1920 before the emergency tariff
was passed farmers were selling below

the cost of production, but the cost of
living to purchasers of the products
had not been reduced. Decline in the
prices of farm products was stopped
by the emergency law and favored the
farmers," he asserted.
"Congress revived the war finance
corporation which provided a billion-
dollar revolving fund to help farmers
in marketing their grain," he stated.
"Under the Fordney-McCumber tariff
law 37 per cent of the products com-
ing into the country will pay an ad
valorem rate and the remainder will be
duty free."
Watson said the United States was
among the last nations of the world
to pass a high protective tariff.

AGREE TO ASSESS LOTS SHORT WAY

Board of Works Members Make
Decision Affecting Section
of E. Michigan St.

Property owners of E. Michigan St.,
between Sherman Dr. and Emerson
Ave., breathed easier today.
The board of public works granted
a plea the 150 foot rule be used in as-
sessing cost of the permanent improve-
ment of the street.
Most of the lots on the improvement
face the cross streets, thereby making
lots with 140 to 180 feet front footage

on Michigan St., and from 40 to 60
feet depth. In some cases, the board
was told, this meant an assessment
of as high as \$1,400 against a single
lot, which might be worth only from
\$600 to \$1,000. The law permits the
board in such cases to assess lots back
of the first row to a depth of 150 feet
a percentage of the benefits.
Approximately 200 Michigan St., per-
sons appeared before the board. Pro-
tests also were made against the
street railway company filling up its
unpaved car track space with gravel
which overflowed on the new pave-
ment and is being ground into it by
heavy trucks.
The delegation asked that the street
railway speed up doubling its tracks
between Bradley and Emerson Aves.
An order for this was given May 19.
