

WORLD COUNCIL OF WOMEN PLANS MEETING IN U. S.

Leaders From Every Nation Will Visit America in 1925.

CLUB FEDERATION GUESTS

Will Ask Congress to Make Appropriation to Meet Expenses of Convention.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—A world council of women will meet in the United States in 1925. Women leaders from practically every civilized land will visit America at that time, guests of the National Council of Women, of which the General Federation of Women's Clubs is a part.

Plans for the Quinquennial of the International Council of women which is the first meeting of this body ever scheduled for America, were launched immediately upon the receipt recently of a cablegram to Mrs. Moore announcing the decision of the executive committee of the International Council of Women at The Hague to accept the invitation of the United States Council to hold its 1925 meeting in Washington, D. C.

In order to insure the presence of women from every one of its foreign organizations at the Norwegian Quinquennial in 1926, an appropriation of \$40,000 kroner from the Storting was secured to help defray the expenses of the delegates from Iceland, Ukraine, Greece, Serbia and Austria.

Asks for Funds

In keeping with this precedent, the United States Council of Women will proceed to take the necessary steps to appeal to Congress to either furnish transportation or to charter a special steamship line to place at the disposal of the foreign delegation.

The International Council is composed of leaders of the national organizations of twenty-eight countries, including the United States.

The objects of the International Council are:

An international propaganda to make permanent peace possible by removing misunderstandings and political obstacles, thus removing cause for future wars.

To make women's vote count for the prevention of world catastrophe.

To raise the political status of women.

To better the condition of children and women everywhere.

To substitute sympathy and justice and faith between nations for tanks and poison gas and international suspicion.

Will Be First of Kind.

It is believed that the meeting will bring together for the first time practically all of the great women leaders of the world.

The National Council of Women, Inc., of the United States of America, which will be official hostess, was founded by Susan B. Anthony. Officers are:

SHED CLOTHES TO SAVE MAN'S SOUL

Three Women and Two Men Arrested in Deserted House in Fanatical Rite.

PARIS, Texas, Oct. 9.—James Daugherty, farmer living four miles from Paris, objected to his wife going without clothing and fasting with two other women and two men, "to keep the husband of one of the women out of the house for five days without eating, are members of a religious sect called the Holy Rollers. They said they went into a "trance" when it was found the husband of one of the women "was bound for hell," and would wear no clothing and eat no food until said husband was saved.

Consequently, they deserted their homes and inhabited the deserted house where the "trance in the nude" continued. Finally Daugherty came to the conclusion the "trance" had lasted long enough and put the officers on the trail.

All five of the persons were wholly unattired when arrested. Officers shut their eyes as they threw their coats off the women. They claim "their religious freedom has been molested and that when the husband is 'saved' they expect to take the matter to the courts to see that they are 'permitted to worship God according to the dictates of their own consciences.'"

Leaders of the sect say that only in the most extreme need do they combine the fashion decree of Adam and Eve with forty days' fast to save an erring friend.

Eight Nations Will Send Representatives to Inter-Allied Convention at New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 9.—Representatives of World War veterans of eight nations will be present at the third international conference of the FIDAC (Federation Interalliée Des Anciens Combattants) or the Inter-Allied Veterans' Federation, which will be held here three days, starting Oct. 12, preceding the national convention of the American Legion.

Questions of international importance affecting the welfare of the former soldier will be discussed. Among these are the problems of immigration and emigration, hospitalization and rehabilitation methods used for disabled soldiers in various countries, exchange and commercial and industrial agreements among allied war veterans.

A constructive effort will be launched by the American delegates to bring about in Europe a better understanding of our immigration laws. By thorough study and explanation it is hoped that much of the misunderstanding and bitterness abroad on this account will disappear.

Each of the member countries will be represented by five delegates. Charles Bertrand, a member of the French Chamber of Deputies, will head the visiting delegations. He is serving his second term as president of the federation.

Col. H. Nelson Jackson of Burlington, Vt., one of the vice commanders of the American Legion, will be chairman of America's representation. Italy's delegation will be headed by Ezio Gioja; that of England by Dudley Taylor; Belgium, Julien David; Roumania, Dr. Vergile Serdar; Czechoslovakia, Henri Holcek; Serbia, Yourichitch Stourm.

Modest Ambitions

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Isadora Duncan, high priestess of a school of dancing all her own, is the first person who has come out of Russia and hasn't talked about one or all of these topics: Bolshevik politics, commercial treaties, red propaganda, paper money, Lenin, Trotsky and food.

Miss Duncan (whose married name is Mrs. Serge Yessenin, though she doesn't use it much) talked about these subjects.

Art, the soul of the Russian people, idiotic movies, her husband (whom she calls by his last name, pronounced E-sane), Ellis Island officials who keep their hats on and talk through their noses, Walt Whitman, Russia's intellectual wealth, horrid persons who imitate her dancing without understanding what it is all about.

AFTERMATH OF WAR IS DECLARED TOO VIVID

Punch of Picture Proves Too Much for Department Store Exhibit

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—The No Jury Society of Artists, organized to protect young and unconventional American artists from cruel juries of critics, opened its first national exhibition here Monday, with what was considered high success, when a picture was ordered withdrawn shortly after the doors were unlocked.

The picture, taken down was characterized as "Too Vivid," by the management of the large department store which had bravely loaned rooms

for the exhibit, and its removal has caused a great furor in art circles here, because everyone admits it is "Good Art." The no jury society is trying to have it restored to its niche.

"Anno Christi, MCMXVIII," by Carl Hoeckner, a widely known artist, is the picture in dispute. It was one of the smallest on view. It is supposed to be symbolic of the aftermath of the great war, and portrays a nude family group, all of whom are terribly emaciated. The father is pictured with his left leg amputated

at the knee, supporting himself on a gnarled home-made crutches. At his side totters the mother, clutching a skinny child in her arms.

The idea, which Hoeckner claims is aimed square at the beholder's mind, lands with tremendous force, and that, according to the objectors, is the trouble.

The store manager claimed that a swarm of angry art patrons had pestered him for two hours, denouncing Hoeckner's picture as "Unclean, Diseased, Insane and Appalling."

"It's funny," commented Hoeckner.

REACTIONISTS ARE STUNNED

Labor's Part in 1922 Political Campaign Is Discussed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Organized labor has "stunned the reactionists so effectively" in the present political campaign, in the opinion of President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, that "the next Congress will be unable to enact any piece

of important reactionary legislation."

In answer to "speculation as to what labor is doing in the present political campaign," Gompers disclosed that "the federation's headquarters is in intimate touch with the entire situation. The records of men have been sent into every State and con-

gressional district. Labor expresses

itself in the primaries by opposing candidates whose records indicated a state of frozen reaction and who were clearly not in harmony with the demands and needs of the time.

"Labor opposed New in Indiana,

McCumber in North Dakota and New-

berry in Michigan. Labor is for Robert M. La Follette, it is for Hiram Johnson, it is for Smith in New York and Pinchot in Pennsylvania, it is for Fraser in North Dakota and for Brookhart in Iowa."

"Faces on the screen all look alike," he said, "as if they were all members of a single type, which began to bore me fifteen years ago."

30,000 SEALS SLAIN

Value of Skins Put at \$3,600,000—820 Whales Caught.

SEATTLE, Oct. 9.—The take of seal skins at Pribiloff Islands, Alaska, this summer is worth \$3,600,000, according to advices received here by Harry Christoffers, agent of the United States Bureau of Fisheries. The natives employed by the Government have slain 30,000 seals this summer, as compared with 26,500 last year. The skins taken last year still are in the hands of the Government, having been held because of low prices.

The price is good now, said Mr. Christoffers, and the 56,500 pelts of the two seasons are to be auctioned soon at St. Louis.

The whale catch is put at \$20 as the north Pacific whaling season nears its close, the estimated production of oil being 30,000 barrels.

Armenian Refugee Tells Story of Her Suffering in Escape From Land of Tragedy

SHERBROOKE, Quebec, Oct. 9.—No thrilling tale of adventure or story of dire suffering will ever hold any interest for Nazalia Nakash, one of the first Armenian refugees to reach this country following the recent bloody advance of the Turks in Anatolia.

Although only 15, she has had crowded into her life during the past few weeks enough tragedy to rival any work of fiction. Only her youth saved her from being driven insane by the horrors of her experience.

Nazalia's family lived at Mardin, Armenia. When the victorious Turks swept through, her uncle and brother were arrested along with 500 of the more important citizens of the town.

All were taken away and were put to death. A couple of days later two other brothers were arrested, thrown into prison and subsequently tortured and killed.

Women Carried On

A number of women and children were taken away for Turkish slave markets and harems. Nazalia and her mother were among those marched out in a miserable procession.

They were finally taken to Ras-ul-Ain after suffering terribly all along the way, many dying from hunger and brutality. There a group of American missionaries tried to help them, but they were soon driven out by the Turks on the grounds that they had been assisting Armenians.

Friendly compatriots tried to help the sufferers, but it was too late. Exposure had so weakened the women that most of them died. Nazalia's mother was among them.

Missionaries Come

The American missionaries came back shortly afterward and the girl was taken care of. After many fruitless attempts permission was secured from the Turks to send 500 orphans to Syria. Nazalia was included in the party.

On her arrival at Aleppo she received news that her brother who is a photographer here, was on his way from Canada to take her home with him. After eleven years of separation

brother and sister were reunited at Beirut.

Her dark eyes still hold the mirrors of the horrors through which she has passed.
