

DONATIONS POUR INTO RILEY FUND

Noblesville Kiwanis Club First of State to Raise Quota.

Contributions totaling \$13,025 to the James Whitcomb Riley Hospital for Children have been received at the State headquarters thus far this week, it has been announced.

The Noblesville Kiwanis Club, with sixty-five members, has contributed \$2,600 as its share of the \$150,000 fund the Kiwanis Clubs of the State will raise for the erection of one of the wings of the hospital, according to a telegram received at the headquarters from Dr. Earl Brooks, president of the club. The Noblesville club is the first in the State to raise its quota of the Kiwanis memorial fund.

Kingman & Co. of Indianapolis has contributed \$2,500 to the fund and a contribution of \$250 also has been received from Bishop Joseph M. Francis. The Progress Club of Sheridan, Ind., with less than twenty members, has raised a \$1,000 fund for the hospital. The Rotary Club of Marion has made a gift of \$100 to the hospital.

FIVE MAY BE LOST OFF SABLE ISLAND

Schooner Marshal Foch Goes Aground and Is Being Pounded by Sea.

By United News HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 12.—A fresh gale of thick weather made difficult Wednesday night the search for five members of the crew of the Gloucester schooner Marshal Foch, who were reported off Sable Island in an open dory.

The schooner, which was wrecked seeking fresh halibut, was settling forward in the sand and was expected to be a total loss.

Captain James Whittle and seven men were landed at Sable Island shortly after the boat stranded. A wireless from the island at 9:30 p. m. reported eight additional men safe on shore.

The dory, with the five remaining men, was last seen by shipmates to be crossing the northeast bar off the island. The dory was said to be well supplied with food, sails and a compass.

BUG HUNT

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
