

MAN PINNED BY UPURNED AUTO

Ollie K. Miller Seriously Injured —Released From Position

by Police.

When an automobile plunged from a culvert into a ditch and turned over early today, Ollie K. Miller, 50, 3700 block on S. Meridian St. was pinned under the automobile and seriously injured.

The accident occurred on Troy Ave., a half mile east of Shelly St. The ditch is about five feet deep. Miller suffered a broken leg and possible internal injuries.

A. O. Pierson, 444 N. Gray St., was passing in his automobile and when he found he was unable to lift the car off of the injured man he drove to a residence some distance from the scene and notified the police. Motor Police Anderson and Giggs, assisted by three men passing in an automobile, righted the wrecked car. C. G. Parker took Miller home.

145,666 REGISTER

Marion County Total is 24,000 Short of

1920 Figures.

Total combined registration for September and October was 145,666, complete returns from all the 265 precincts of Marion County showed. For the presidential election in 1920 a total of more than 160,000 was registered.

"Although this figure is unofficial, the official estimate, which will be made public within ten days, will differ little," County Auditor Leo K. Peeler said.

The new \$125,000 public school of Lawrence town was dedicated last night. The principal dedicatory address was made by Benjamin J. Burris, State superintendent of public instruction.

"Indiana's most vital question is education," said Mr. Burris. "Fifty years ago \$15,000,000 was expended for elementary and high school education and last year \$750,000,000 was expended and an increased is demanded."
