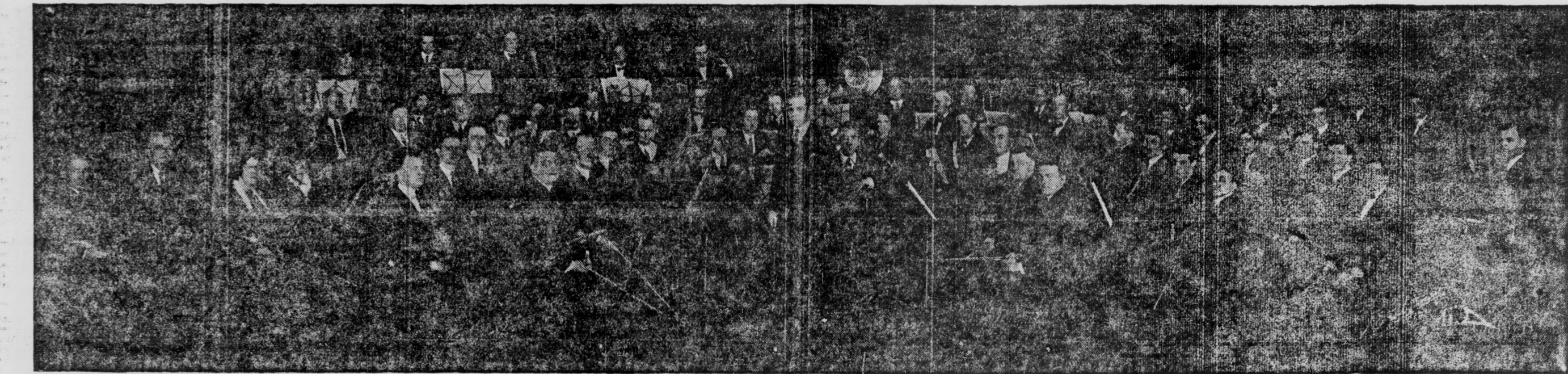


# Indianapolis Orchestra of Seventy Pieces to Give Concert in Honor of Alexander Ernestinoff



Seventy musicians of Indianapolis will play under the baton of S. Leopold Kohls at an appreciation concert

to be given in the Circle Theater at 10:45 a. m. Sunday to honor Alexander Ernestinoff, known as the "grand

old man of Indianapolis orchestral music." This orchestra will be the largest orchestra of local musicians assembled in the last ten years.

Each musician has donated his service for the Sunday morning concert. Every cent obtained from the sale of tickets will be placed in a

benefit fund for Mr. Ernestinoff. All musical organizations in the city are supporting this concert.

Indications are that the appearance of this big "Indianapolis-made orchestra" will pave the way for an Indianapolis symphony orchestra, which is a dream of every music lover in this city.

The program will include Goldmark's overture, "Sakuntala," which has never been played publicly here.

## AUTO DEALERS PLAN ADDITION

Wangelin-Sharp Company Will Start New \$30,000 Service Rooms in Near Future.

Plans are in progress for a new \$30,000 addition to the present plant of the Wangelin-Sharp Company, 442-449 Virginia Ave., dealers in Ford cars, according to Harry J. Wangelin, president of the company. The addition, which will be used as a service room, will have a frontage of forty feet. The depth of the new addition will be 150 feet, corresponding to the depth of the present structure.

The proposed building will be constructed of brick, with asbestos roof, and will have all modern equipment. It will be entirely fireproof, it is said. Special attention has been given to the ventilation for this part because of the gas fumes attendant to service-room work.

With the addition, the company will have a frontage of 333 feet. Robert Frost Daggett, architect, 959 Lemcke Annex, is working on the plans for the addition.

## GLAND STEALING IS NEW OUTLAWRY

Two Instances Are Reported Wherein Victims Suffer Loss of Organs.

By United Press. CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Two men were reported within the last twenty-four hours as having been prayed upon by the gland robbers.

Captain Thomas Coughlin, head of the police squad investigating the strange crimes, advanced the theory that the gland snatchers were operating under orders of a wealthy, aged Chicagoan.

Joseph Wozniak, strong and healthy the first victim reported, met several congenial companions in a saloon and later was kidnapped, drugged and operated on.

Later a woman called police headquarters and said her husband had been a victim of the gland robbers, while intoxicated.

The Wozniak operation was performed by some one who was familiar with the technique of a physician. Although there is no similar case in modern history, Dr. Sullivan stated it was a common practice in China 2,000 years ago to rob men of their vital organs.

## SCORES PRESENT FOREIGN POLICY

Frederick Van Nuys Speaks at McCord's Park Democratic Rally.

"The weak, uncertain foreign policy under the present Administration must be abandoned," said Frederick Van Nuys, former United States district attorney, today at an all-day rally at McCord's Park. "The failure of the President to follow a stable economic policy is the cause of our industrial plight today. All tourists who come back from Europe bring back the same message. 'We must not exclude our European neighbors from our trading enterprises.'"

The speaker compared our present policy with that of a corner groceryman who maintains a policy of aloofness from neighborhood affairs because he has been prosperous and argues that his good fortune will go on regardless of changing conditions.

In conclusion Mr. Van Nuys said: "The policy of splendid isolation is past. The day is approaching when American statesmen will be accused of provincialism who maintains this policy while his Nation stagnates and rets in a spirit of self-sufficiency."

We do not affiliate with any church, nor with any secret, fraternal, benevolent, political, civic or protective organization, eschewing, indeed, organization in any form. We do not, however, in any sense oppose the activities nor the principles of good which may be inherent in any existing system.

We persistently and intelligently herald the Second Advent of the Messiah, approximately at the end of this century, when the Man Christ Jesus shall return to the earth and establish the forever Kingdom of Heaven upon the broken remnants of earth kingdoms. We base our conclusions in this regard upon the 24th chapter of Matthew, the 13th of I. Corinthians, the 20th of Revelation, together with I. Thessalonians, 4:13-18. AMEN.

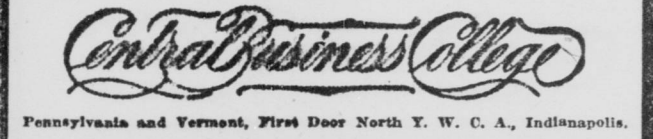
