

## Goal Line of Cathedral High School Eleven Has Not Been Crossed This Season—Six Victories Chalked Up

Cathedral High School football team, coached by Al Feeney, former Notre Dame star, will bring its season to a close Friday with a game with Shortridge. The record of Feeney's eleven is an impressive one and, although the team will be crippled for the coming contest by the loss of three players, it still remains the favorite to win over the grididers of Coach Gorton.

The loss of Captain Trenck to Cathedral was about the harder blow the team could receive, as the rangy leader, besides playing end on defense dropped back to carry the ball and was used to throw forward passed and receive them. A great deal of the attack of the eleven was built around Trenck and declaration of his ineligibility at so late a date makes his place extremely difficult to fill. Carroll and Roth are fighting it out for a chance to start at the captain's end in the game with Shortridge. Madden, a center, and Laffey, sub back field man, will not get into the game.

Cathedral has not been scored on this season and in five games has run up 133 points to its opponent's none. Its most notable victories have been over Wilkinson, Wiley of Terre Haute and Peru. Coach Feeney has built up a powerful prep team out of practically new material. His backfield of O'Haire or Riley at quarter, Royston and Sisson at halves and Mullenholz at full has a lot of punch. Baker is also a full back. Jackson, a star of the back field, was lost in mid-season. Sisson does the kicking and is far above the average.

The line has given a good account of itself in every game played so far and the Shortridge forwards will probably have their hands full with the following players opposing them: Ruckelshaus, Davies, Carroll and Roth at ends; Dickie, Whiteman, Joe McCarthy at tackle; Glaska, Mootz and Crosby at guard, and F. McCarthy and Feske, center.

It will be up to Feeney to build another team next year, as he loses sixteen players this season, including almost every one of his best men. As Feeney says: "You got to start all over again each year."

The game Friday is attracting a great deal of interest among the followers of high school football in this city and especially among the Cathedral rooters. A big pep session is on the bill tonight at the Spink-Arms Hotel on N. Meridian St. for the Cathedral team.

The disabled soldiers at Ft. Harrison will be guests of Cathedral at the game Friday. They will be in charge of Judge Delbert Wilmeth.

### COACH SMITH IS SURE HIS TEAM WILL BE VICTOR

Glenn Warner Has Been Engaged by Pacific School to Coach Eleven.

California Has Crack Team and Championship of Coast Is at Stake.

California is banking on three of its veteran stars, Erb, Muller and Nichols, to insure a win over Stanford when Andy Smith's eleven clashes with its greatest rival at Palo Alto, Cal., on Nov. 25.

On the cost the Stanford-California game takes on all the color of a clash between Harvard, Yale or Princeton in the East. This, despite the fact that Stanford for several years, has not been able to offer very stern opposition.

While Stanford did not look very strong at the opening of the season the eleven has been brought along by slow stages until it is now believed to be in shape to offer California a real argument.

Last winter Stanford in an effort to get on an equality with California engaged the services of Glenn Warner, famous coach of Pittsburgh University. It was a ten-strike for Stanford and is certain to show results shortly.

Warner is still under contract at Pittsburgh and is coaching there this year. However, he is installing his methods at Stanford through the medium of two of his former star players, Andy Kerr and "Tiny" Thornhill.

Thornhill assisted Charley Moran at Centre College last year. Thornhill is a line coach and Head Coach Moran says it was Thornhill's great work with the Centre forwards that enabled them to outplay Harvard and make the Centre victory possible.

Coach Andy Smith of California isn't worrying about the preparations that Stanford is making to eventually capture football honors on the coast. Smith says his team of this year is even better than last and that California will win sure.

In the six years Moran has been here Centre has lost but five games, and two of them to Harvard.

### LANDIS AND BAN DUE FOR SCRAP

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Ban Johnson, militarist boss of the American League, apparently is looking for a fight at the winter meeting of the major leagues and more apparently he will get it.

While Ban has been talking largely in generalities, the sources through which he generally makes his plans known have it that he is after Commissioner Landis.

If Johnson starts a fight on Landis, the most logical field of battle will be over the draft operation, the only big issue in baseball now. Lined up on this question against Landis, or any other question, Johnson will have to fight three of his own club owners and the entire National League.

The signs indicate that he will lose as he lost before.

John A. Heydler, president of the National League, has already expressed the opinion that the National League is behind Landis and he never speaks unless he knows he has his league behind him.

Charles A. Stoneham, president of the Giants, is out today with an emphatic endorsement of Landis. He says he does not like the present draft agreement, but that as long as it is a matter of contract between the miners and the majors it must be allowed to run to its legal end.

Charles Ebbets, owner of the Brooklyn club, might have his heart against Landis because of his policy against spending any kind of money, but the whip will be cracked over him as it was at the meetings last winter.
