

EDUCATION WEEK SET FOR DEC. 3-9

Proclamation Urges Mothers to Visit Schools.

Dr. Kate Waller Barrett, president of the American Legion Auxiliary, has issued a proclamation urging American mothers to visit the schools their children attend during Better Education Week, Dec. 3-9, for the promotion of better citizenship. The proclamation follows:

Your cooperation is sought in bringing before the citizens of your community the need for better schools, better teachers, better educational methods. You can do this through observance of American Education Week, Dec. 3-9. It will be put before the public on those days by the American Legion, the National Education Association and the United States Bureau of Education.

You can cooperate by going to the classroom where your child is enrolled; by turning your attention to the children of the foreign born in your city; by studying the educational system in vogue, and by learning how you can remedy its defects through your vote in school elections.

Y. W. C. A. Now Teaches Girls Art of Vamping

The Y. W. C. A. now conducts a Charm School, a la Alice Duer Miller, author of the original "Charm School," and Wallace Reid, hero and teacher of the movie "Charm School."

And, one of the most popular lessons was a talk by Mrs. Charles Rush on "How to Be Charming With Men," which is just a polite way of telling how to "vamp."

But even the most Victorian of Victorian grandmothers need have no fear that the "pupils" of the Charm School will be corrupted. For they are taught that "handsome is as handsome does," and that inner charm is necessary to outer charm.

The school—popular, of course—is in session every Wednesday night. The first series of six lessons was completed last week and the second series was begun Wednesday night.

The Chamber of Commerce is co-operating with the industrial department of the Y. W. C. A. in this second series, and—the "teachers" will be men.

It may seem strange to have men

teach women how to be charming; but it's logical, for it is the men on whom the women practise their charms.

Miss Alice Newman of the Y. W. C. A. educational department had charge of the organization of the Charm School.

Stress Appearance

For the girls who have not yet learned how to be charming, as taught by the Y. W. C. A. school, here is a summary of what the "pupils" were told:

Mrs. Harry Griffith, speaking on "How to Be Charming in Appearance," stressed cleanliness and simplicity and good taste in enhancing one's strong points through the lines and color of apparel.

Mrs. Louis Bacon told how to create a charming home by grouping furniture to the best advantage and discarding everything not necessary for comfort or decoration.

Mrs. Wilmer Christian demonstrated "How to Make a Guest Comfortable" and showed the girls how to set a table for dinner and tea. She suggested easily prepared menus and showed how they could be served charmingly.

Mrs. Rush, when she told how to be charming with men, emphasized naturalness, reserve and unflin-

courtesy and the necessity of having something about which to talk.

Giving a lesson on "How to Be Charming in Public," Miss Elizabeth Browning informed her pupils that kindness, sympathy and dignity are necessary.

Miss Newman summarized the course, pointing out the fact that to use these outward charms to the best advantage, the girls would need a substantial and fundamental charm of personality, not just a "vener."

That, girls, is the charm school of the Y. W. C. A. The next chapter in its history will be written by the men when they give their lessons.

STATE NEW ROAD IS BREAKING UP

S. M. Timberlake Co. Under Fire for Keystone Ave. Job.

An investigation by the State board of accounts to determine whether the

S. M. Timberlake Company disregarded plans and specifications in constructing the Keystone Ave. concrete road was begun today.

The road, accepted in December, 1920, by the county at a cost of \$119,000, is breaking up, a report by the county highway superintendent states. Workmen under supervision of John J. Griffith will bore holes in the highway, which is three miles long, to ascertain whether the contract was fulfilled.

The road was built under the supervision of Surveyor Griffith, but he declared the county at the time was building sixteen miles of paved road, and that it was impossible for him to be there all the time.

The Timberlake Company is liable under its bond and may be forced by court to bring the road up to specifications, said Leo K. Fessler, county auditor, after viewing the road.
