

## PLAN NEW CHURCH FOR NORTH M. E.

Temporary Tabernacle Now in  
Process of Construction  
by Congregation.

REV. JESSE BOGUE PASTOR

Completed Building Will Cost  
\$250,000 — Thanksgiving  
Service Wednesday Night.

**BY THE VISITOR**  
The building of a temporary tabernacle from which will spring the new North Methodist Episcopal Church on Maple Road and Meridian St. is now under way.

Present plans call for the completion of the temporary tabernacle by February, the Rev. Jesse Bogue, pastor, said.

Mr. Bogue said when the final plans are completed for the big church plant the institution will represent more than \$250,000.

The plan being used is similar to the plan used successfully by the Tabernacle Presbyterian Church. This church first built a temporary tabernacle at which all functions of the church were held. Using the tabernacle as the center, the church grew until the first unit of the Tabernacle Presbyterian Church will be dedicated the first of the year.

**Expect Large Growth**  
As the North Methodist Church grows and becomes a factor in the life of the north part of the city it will receive the earnest cooperation of Bishop F. D. Leete. In the growth and expansion of the Methodist church in the north part of the city this church is destined by its location to play an important part.

It will require a number of years before the final plans for this church have been carried out. The program

entails the expenditure of large sums of money.

While the plans of the future are being worked out, the church membership is growing. The Rev. Bogue is building up the various departments. On Wednesday night a Thanksgiving service will be held. A concert and an illustrated lecture will be given.

The temporary tabernacle will cost about \$10,000.

"There is nothing decadent about the Chinese," said Dr. Grose. He declared, however, that they need a strong national government, must adopt modern methods in industry and must have a spiritual renaissance before they can take a high place among the leading nations of the world.

## New York Ex-Cops Praise Our Local Traffic System

Indianapolis is strides ahead of other cities of the same size and of many large cities in the regulation of traffic, in the opinion of Joe Wilson and Frank Wilson, former New York traffic officers.

"I was in New York when the traffic tower system was getting started," Frank Wilson said while in Indianapolis. "People, as they no doubt have done here, laughed at the funny little houses on the poles."

"It is a wonderful system. The only trouble here is that the motorists whizz around the corners without signal."

"You have ten blocks covered by the signal system here. That is as much as they have in New York. There they have the officers on each side of the street intersections and none in the center of the street. These officers never permit a pedestrian to leave the curb and be caught in traffic. All walkers leave the curb at the same time. There is no jaywalking and no diagonal crossing. People should be prosecuted for crossing in the middle of the block."

"Another thing I have to commend about your local traffic system is the way the officers work," remarked Joe Wilson.

Now that 'bird' evidently thought that he was rattling the corner cop. He was not, and furthermore that officer can see both ways, runs the traffic the way he is directed from the tower and no doubt the driver in the car ahead was more nerve-racked by the continuous sound of the horn than was the cop."

"I notice your east and west traffic never moves less than two blocks, and sometimes more. That is better than it does in New York. There sometimes it is one block and sometimes as high as five, but here it seems that you get an average of two."

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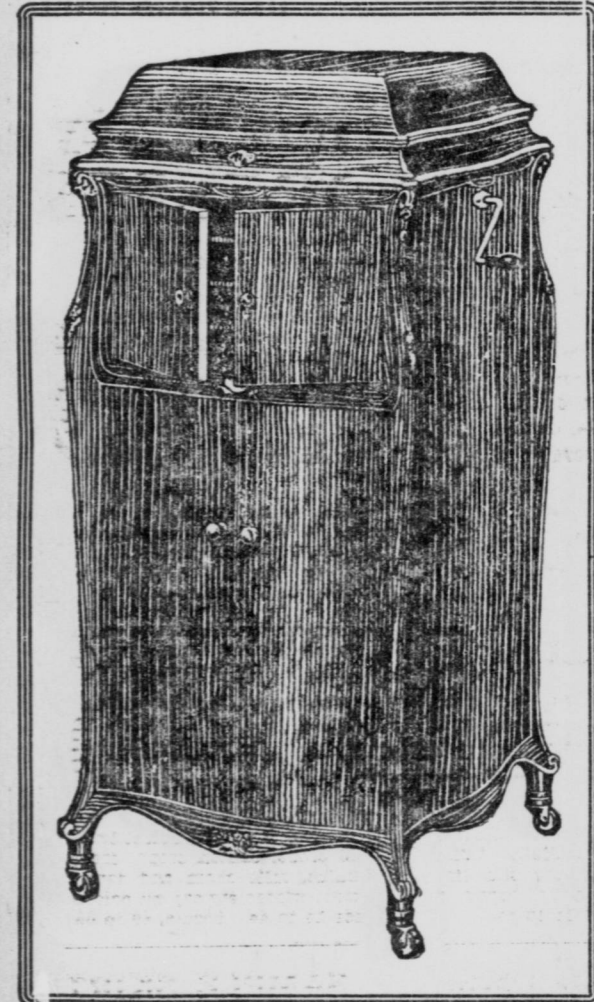

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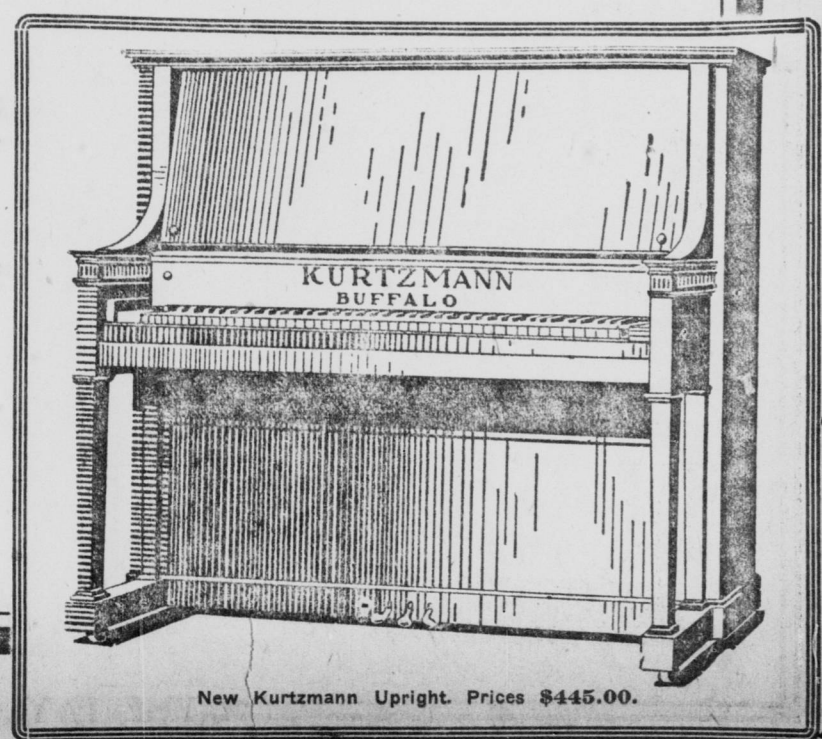
