

CLEMENCEAU PAYS QUAKERS TRIBUTE

Ex-Premier Thanks Church for Reconstruction Work in Speech at Richmond.

SAYS FRENCH ARE GRATEFUL

Little Girl Is Kissed by 'Tiger' When She Presents Bouquet of Flowers.

RICHMOND, Ind., Dec. 4.—Georges Clemenceau, ex-premier of France, paid tribute to the Quakers in America and the work of the church's reconstruction committee in his country, in a brief talk made from the platform of his special train, which stopped here for a few minutes en route from St. Louis, Mo., to Baltimore, Md.

He said that he was familiar with the principles of the Quaker Church, having been associated with a number of Quakers in New England forty-three years ago. He said that work of the reconstruction units in France during and after the war was too keenly appreciated by the French people for him to adequately express their thanks.

At the conclusion of the talk a little girl presented the Tiger with a large bouquet of flowers. She was lifted to the platform by a man standing near and the ex-premier kissed her several times on both cheeks.

A delegation composed of William Dudley Foulke, Rudolph G. Leeds and President David M. Edwards of Earlham College met M. Clemenceau on his arrival here.

PRINCETON FACES WATER SHORTAGE

Pollution of Patoka River Is Attributed to Mines.

PRINCETON, Ind., Dec. 4.—This city is facing a water shortage due to pollution of the waters of Patoka River, from which the city draws its supply. The river has been entirely "cleaned" of fish during the past few days and the surface of the water is covered with dead fish, killed by pollution.

The condition is thought to be due to minerals coming into the stream from mines in Pike County and concentrating due to extremely low water.

POSTAL DEFICIT GREATLY REDUCED

Annual Shortage Is Cut \$21,000,000, Report Shows.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The Post-office Department, often called the "largest business in the world," has reduced its annual deficit by nearly \$21,000,000 during the last year.

This has been possible, Postmaster General Work declared in his annual report, just made public, by a corresponding increase in postal revenues. Expenditures were only \$780,835 in excess of those for the preceding year, and this, he said, was accomplished in business costing nearly \$550,000,000 for the year.

For further improvement of the service Work made the following legislative recommendations:

1. To authorize the postmaster general to prescribe domestic money order fees, because "changing conditions in business require prompt, suitable changes in money-order fees."

2. To increase the rates of interest on postal savings, totaling \$140,430,167, a slight increase over the preceding year.

3. To authorize the collection of additional postage on insufficiently and improperly addressed mail.

4. Numerous amendments to existing laws for the welfare of postal employees.

YOUTH IS ARRESTED IN OLD FAIRBANKS MANSION

Police Answer Burglary Call and Find Intruder.

Arnold Hoover, 20, of St. Louis, Mo., was arrested today when he was found hiding behind some rubbish on the third floor of the old Fairbanks home, Thirtieth and Sheridan Sts. Hoover made his way into the house, the home of the late Charles W. Fairbanks, former Vice President of the United States, by way of a coal chute. He pulled a burglar alarm, apparently thinking he was turning off the switch.

The burglar alarm signal was received by the A. B. C. Detective agency. Police were notified and made the run to the house. The home, which contains about fifty rooms, has been unoccupied for several years.

FIFTY NEW TALES MEN DRAWN FOR HERRIN JURY

Attorneys Hope to Complete Massacre Jury This Week.

The prospective jurors, the majority of whom are farmers, were summoned during the long adjournment of court since last Wednesday. Both State and defense attorneys were expected to drive the veniremen through rapid grilling in an attempt to complete the jury this week.

After leaving the home of E. J. Bailey, 930 Taylor St., at 19 yesterday William Cooper, 619 E. Ohio St., was seized from behind by a hold-up man who pressed a revolver against his head and forced him to walk behind some billboards. There the robber took a diamond ring valued at \$125 and \$12.75 from Cooper.

The robbery occurred in the rear of the Bailey home. Mrs. Myrtle Hudson, 911 E. Washington St., was passing. She thought the two men were having a fight.

BODY OF GIRL IS FOUND IN SWAMP

Relatives of Missing Women Seek to Identify Corpse.

Pastor Discusses Best Type of Girl for Wife

"To be a girl makes a good wife?" That was the question answered by Dr. E. A. Robertson at the East Park M. E. Church Sunday night.

"Marriage promises the greatest happiness and usefulness to both parties if they undertake so solemn a responsibility with a sense of religious values," Dr. Robertson said. "I am not talking about mere church membership or so-called piety, but about the kind of religious life that banishes self from the center of one's interests and knows how to forgive and forget, to bear and forbear."

"Health is surely an important prerequisite to marriage. Common Sense Need

"A far too uncommon thing is common sense, hard to define, but we know what it means. Every bride-elect should be endowed with some degree of domestic tastes. We all agree that her great vacation is house-making."

"A normal home consists of a father, a mother and children. The girl whose definition of home does not include children should not marry. She should have capacity for intellectual growth and be able to keep abreast of her husband's intellectual interests."

"She should be a member of your own cultural class. The prospective groom should require in the prospective bride a sense of responsibility. He should be wary of the 'flapper.' While such a type—all too common—is likely to outgrow much of her foolishness."

"No girl should marry who has not informed herself as to the obligations and responsibilities of married life. Finally and chiefly the greatest of these essentials to happiness though married is love."

"But where are the model girls to be found? Certainly not in the dance halls nor the cheap picture shows. We suggest that they are more likely to be found in Christian homes. In the Sunday School, prayer meeting and particularly in the number of regular and active members of a church."

"All other elements equal, a cultured Christian girl makes the best—if not a model—wife," Dr. Robertson said.

RIGHT IS HABIT

The idea that it is easier to do right than wrong is not altogether true, the Rev. Jesse Bogue, of the North Methodist Church, said in a sermon Sunday evening. It is not hard to do right if we have acquired that habit; but if we have been doing wrong it is not so easy.

"The law of the spirit and life of Jesus Christ overcomes the law of sin and death. He said the former law commands us to arise and the latter keeps us down. It is not especially a law requiring us to repent, but to help us have an undying passion to have others come to God and be good. It says 'do' instead of 'don't' for the reason that people get into trouble because they know no better."
