# WANT AUTOIST ON KILLING CHARGE

Greenfield Authorities Hold  
Warrant for M. S. Lloyd.

Sheriff New of Greenfield today notified Indianapolis police he holds a warrant for the driver of the automobile which struck and fatally injured Mrs. William Geisel of New Palestine at Gem, Ind., Wednesday night.

M. S. Lloyd, 1326 N. Kealing Ave., was the driver, local police were informed. They said they were misinformed yesterday when they were told the driver had stopped at the accident only a few minutes and then disappeared.

It was learned today that Lloyd not only stopped after the accident, but helped to carry the injured woman into a house near the accident. He told his full name and address and later visited the hospital to inquire as to Mrs. Geisel's condition. Mrs. Lloyd accompanied her husband to the hospital Tuesday night. She said she and her husband offered to do anything they could for the Geisels.

Lloyd said he struck Mrs. Geisel in avoiding running over her daughter.

GOVERNOR GIVES THIRD  
OFFICIAL XMAS GIFT

Philip Zoercher Renamed to Serve
