The league's program for the present legislative session includes acceptance by Indiana of the Shepard-Towner act, an amendment to the mothers' aid act which would make it mandatory upon the counties to provide machinery for carrying out the act; amendment of the constitution to change the method of amending it, and amendment of the election law to provide for equal representation of men and women in political party organizations.
