

# NEW ANTI-SPEEDING CRUSADE LEADS TO SIXTEEN ARRESTS

## ANDERSON MAKES CLINTON COUNTRY SAFE FOR POLICE

Roadhouse Keepers Plead Guilty to Violating Dry Laws.

AGENT TELLS OF DANGERS

Many Other Sentences Are Imposed in Federal Court.

Vermilion County was made safe for Federal prohibition agents by Judge Albert B. Anderson today. Sentences were imposed on a number of former keepers of roadhouses near Clinton after they had entered pleas of guilty to violation of Federal prohibition laws.

"It is a good country to stay out of if you haven't a lot of law with you," William Hindle, prohibition agent, told Judge Anderson in explaining why he had not attempted to raid any roadhouses single-handed. He then told of one place where the "bouncer" enforced a semblance of order by virtue of an enormous revolver dangling from a holster at his side.

Judge Anderson fined a number of alleged roadhouse keepers in the vicinity of Clinton on charges of violating the Federal prohibition laws.

Rudolph Broto, proprietor of a country club at Centenary, and Hartley George of Terre Haute, proprietor of a place in Centenary, received fines of \$500 each, with six months in jail.

George Minnett, proprietor of an alleged roadhouse at Four Corners, was given a jail sentence of six months.

George Turner of Westfield was fined \$200 and sentenced to six months in jail.

The case of Nellie Hart, 22, operator of a resort at Blanford, was taken under advisement by Judge Anderson. Banto Bazy, proprietor of the Blanford Inn, was sentenced to six months in jail. The case of his wife, Orfina, was nolle.

Fred Gibbons of Lyford, Parke County, was fined \$300 and sentenced to six months in jail on a charge of violating the Federal prohibition law. Gibbons was said to have lived at Prohibition Officer Bert C. Morgan when his place was raided about two months ago.

William Miller, Evansville, was sentenced to one year and one day in jail for alleged transporting of narcotics.

Francis Fay Burke, 1946 S. Senate Ave., formerly of Evansville, who, it was charged, was working with Miller, was sentenced to one day in jail. Seven cases of alleged violation of the Federal narcotic law were dealt with as follows:

Dr. Marvin Fisher, Lafayette, Ind., one day in jail.

Fred Goodman, Lafayette, one day in jail. His wife, Wilma, 19, was dismissed.

William F. Lawler, Indianapolis, four months in jail.

Otto L. Meadows, Indianapolis, ninety days in jail.

Chester Simpson, Bargserville, a year and a day in jail.

Dr. Evan C. Potten, Madison, fined \$100.

Too many wives and forgery of government allotment checks brought a sentence of eighteen months to Ivan R. Fuson of Elletts, Wis. Fuson admitted forgery. It developed during the hearing that during the war he had married two young women. This resulted, he said, in a six months sentence for wife-slavery being imposed on him in Washington.

Augustus N. Vosburg, formerly of Philadelphia, received a sentence of one year and one day for impersonating government officers. He obtained money from Harry A. Plunkett, barber, 145 E. Market St., by representing himself as a Department of Justice operative. It was testified.

Harry Crawford of Gary admitted he had transported a stolen automobile from Toledo to Gary last year. He was given a sentence of eighteen months.

CONFERENCE PLANS BILL ON BELT ROAD ELEVATION

That the city should advance money to begin work on track elevation along the Belt Railroad, and that its share of the cost of the work should be 35 per cent in place of 25 per cent, as under the present law, was the consensus of opinion at a conference between officials of the Indianapolis Union Railroad, City Engineer John L. 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## Night Riders Join Motor Cops in Pursuit of Fast Drivers.

Sixteen alleged speeders were arrested in a new police crusade against speed law violators which started Tuesday and continued during the night and early today. ## STATE CHARGES MOB MEMBERS TESTIFY IN COURT

Alleged Murderers in Mer Rouge Terror Plot Tell Own Story on Stand.

By United Press COURTHOUSE, BASTROP, La., Jan. 17.—Alleged murderers of Watt Daniel and Thomas F. Richards, hooded mob victims, are being allowed to testify at the open hearings into the reign of terror in Morehouse parish. State officials charged today.

At least one man, whom the State still seek to identify as a member of the black-masked mob that tortured and killed, has told his story in an attempt to cover up his connection with the crime, according to State's attorneys.

Examination of witnesses continued today. Sheriff Fred Carpenter, named as a member of the Ku-Klux Klan, was first called.

McKoin Identified Identification of Dr. E. M. McKoin, former mayor of Mer Rouge, as one of four black-hooded men who visited a church and at the point of revolvers warned the congregation to be good, and the first appearance of an attorney representing an alleged murder suspect were the sensations Tuesday at the State's open hearing on the torture-murders of Watt Daniel and Thomas F. Richards.

W. P. Kirkpatrick was another of the church-raiding quartet, G. W. Walker, who lives between Mer Rouge and Collinston, declared.

The black hoods came to the Little Fellowship Church, where Walker goes every Sunday, last May, he said, but he was unable to recognize the two accompanying McKoin and Kirkpatrick.

Brandish Revolvers Brandishing revolvers, the invaders warned the worshippers against "any more trouble, because we warn just once."

A short time before, Walker said, there had been some fighting around the church.

Jack Hayden was also in church that Sunday.

"I think like the rest of the folks that two of them was Dr. McKoin and Mr. Kirkpatrick," he testified.

This was the second instance during the trial.

## Denial

PETERSON PROMISES MORE ANTI-TOBACCO MEASURES

Cigarette Smoking by Women to Be First Target.

Further bills aimed at tobacco, particularly cigarette, will be introduced in the House of Representatives soon, Representative John A. Peterson of Swayzee, said today.

Peterson said his first desire was to "take a jab" at the use of cigarettes by women, then at the general use of tobacco, both as "forerunners to the elimination of all tobacco products."

Peterson and Representative Lenzo L. Shull of Sharpville last week introduced identical bills providing for the legalization of tobacco advertising in this State, but both failed to pass committees.

EGG AND COAL PRICES GO DOWN AFTER WARM SPELL

As the thermometer goes up, coal and egg prices go down.

Local leaders were divided today in opinions as to future market conditions, but all indicated that the downward dip in prices was in some measure due to high maneuvers of the mercury in the last few days.

Eggs fell to a low price Monday, and today were quoted at 42 and 43 cents by Indianapolis wholesalers. On Jan. 1 they hovered around the 52-cent mark.

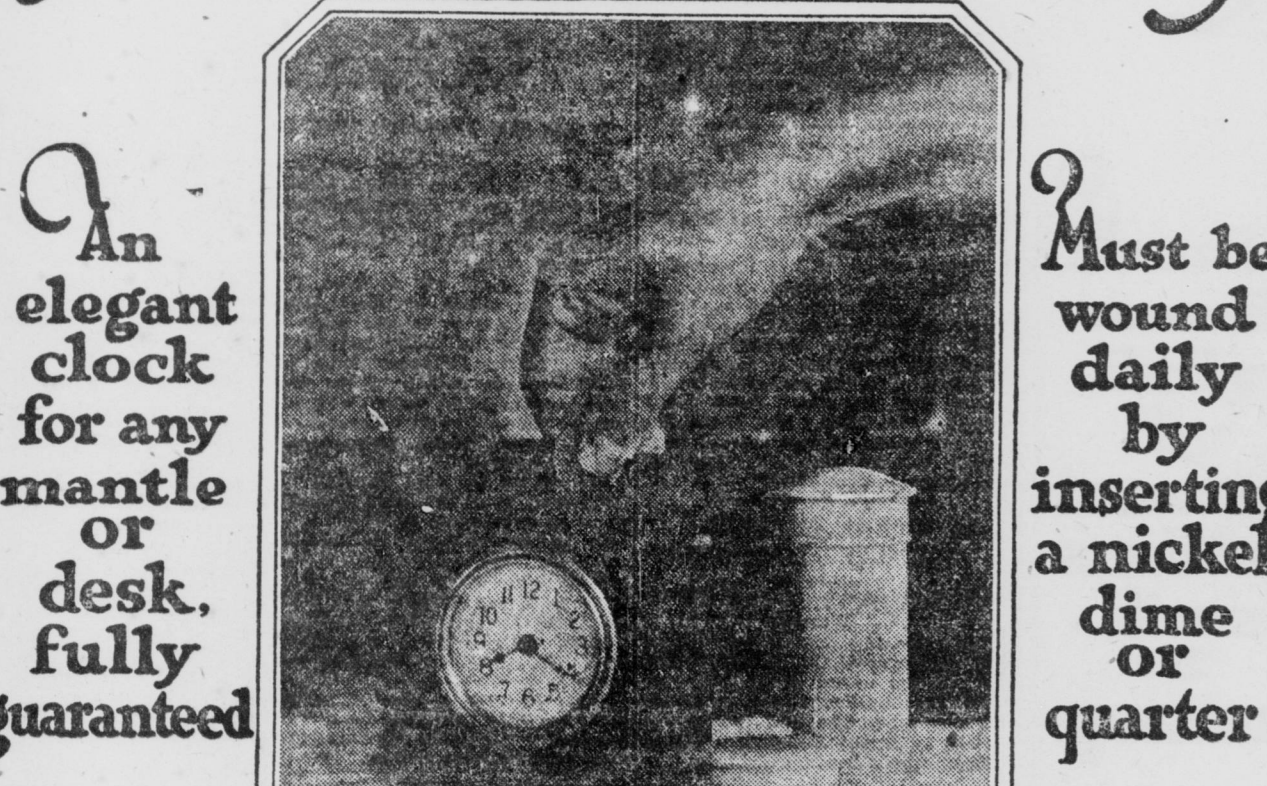
