





BUTLER CAMPAIGN TO OPEN MONDAY

Cooperation Sought in Drive for \$1,500,000.

One hundred Indianapolis citizens will be named to cooperate with the general committee to raise \$1,500,000 as a building and endowment fund for Butler College. J. W. Atherton, executive secretary of the committee, announced today. The campaign will begin Monday, with headquarters at 1103 Fletcher Savings and Trust building.

The campaign will be for \$900,000, to be held in perpetual trust by the Butler Foundation, and for \$600,000, to be used for improvements on the new Butler campus at Fairview Park.
