
Babe Ruth was scheduled to leave Hot Springs for New Orleans today. Beware of the ponies at Jefferson Park, Babe.

Mansfield, former Anderson forward, poled a long one from mid-field in the closing minutes and the Omars trooped off, weak from fright at their close call.

The Em-Roes have a fine team. Babu and Behrent, old timers though they are, play a bang-up game. Hite at center fights all the time and Williams and Montgomery are plenty fast.




