The average purchaser paid \$1.00 for a head of first quality beef, a peak of prices for the week. Demand for buying and perhaps as much higher than the ebb. Lights sold from \$8.75 and heavies general \$8.50, while mixed grades sold between these figures. The heaviest of the light grades sold for \$8.50 to \$8.75, and pigs were firm. Receipts totaled 3,000, with 616 holdovers.

The cattle market experienced a usual week-end dullness, due to the receipts of 3,000 head. The market for Steer prices closed a shade lower for the week, while butcher grades were generally steady.

The calf market showed an advance in tone of strength due to a broadening demand, but the market was not strong, with few calves brought \$13, while the practical top remained at \$12.50. The bulks sold between \$11.50 and \$12. Receipts, 350, with 1,000 at start.
