The committee on program arrangement especially desires ladies to attend the show during the afternoon, H. L. Richardt, chairman, announced today.



A flaming electric arch over Thirty-Eighth St., bearing the words, "Home Show," advertises the show to motorists for many squares. Posters selected from those submitted in the poster contest have been placed in show windows in downtown stores.

Two complete houses, furnished in every respect, are features of the exposition. An English cottage, constructed of brick, has been erected by the building material division of the Commercial Credit, Audit and Correct Weights Bureau. The cottage cost \$10,000. It is built of all types of bricks, laid in various styles. The cottage is surrounded by a lawn and brick wall. The house was designed by Merritt Harrison, local architect.

Another complete house is one erected by eight local dealers. They are D. Sommers Company, Capitol Lumber Company, Indianapolis Paint and Color Company, Romer Electric Company, Bethard Wall Paper Company, Haynes-Sanders Auto Company, Central Supply Company and Bertermann brothers. The house, consisting of four rooms and a bath, is a suburban bungalow type. It is furnished in every detail. The bungalow is also surrounded by a lawn with shrubbery planned by a landscape architect.

"Never before has there been such activity directed to the better home owner than under one roof at the fairground today," said Henry Hottel, executive secretary of the Indianapolis Real Estate Board, today. "Every craft, from the architect to landscape gardener, has put forth efforts to show the public what is possible in way of better homes."
