

DRY AGENTS DRAIN STATE OF LIQUOR

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Report Shows Indiana Fast Becoming 'Sahara.'

Indiana is one of the driest States in the Union, according to report compiled by Bert C. Morgan, Federal prohibition director for Indiana. As proof, Morgan cited three accomplishments of the Indiana Federal prohibition force within the past year: The George Remus case, which had its beginning at Lawrenceburg; the closing of Vermillion County roadhouses, and the conviction of fifty-five defendants in the Gary liquor conspiracy case.

During 1922 the Indiana department, Morgan said, confiscated 554 stills, 6,655 gallons of spirits, 6,545 gallons of malt liquor, 6,230 gallons of wine, 114,398 gallons of mash, 778 fermenters, made 1,001 arrests and closed fourteen places by injunction.

Chief Rikhoff Announces Change Following Complaint of Delay.

A plan to prevent loss of police reports intended to notify the detective department of robberies should investigate has been put into effect, Police Chief Rikhoff said today.

Police were severely criticized Thursday by Harry Gompf, treasurer of the Lindeman Wood Finish Company, 1602 W. Washington St., because of delay in investigating a safe-cracking at the company's plant several weeks ago. Father Dillon Declares Superior Treated Him With Disrespect and Ordered Him to Leave—Shooting Occurs at Dinner Table.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., April 13.—The Rev. Father Charles Dillon, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church, is being held at police headquarters today for the shooting to death of the Rev. Father Henry O'Neill, pastor of the church, to which he confessed, police officials said.

The shooting took place at the dinner table last night. Four shots were fired, all of which took effect. One pierced the abdomen, another entered just above the heart, the third penetrated the right temple and the fourth pierced a lung of the pastor.

According to the confession Father Dillon made to the chief of police, he had been driven to fury by alleged ill-treatment at the hands of the pastor.

"He treated me with disrespect almost ever since I came here from Battle Creek, thirteen months ago," Father Dillon said.

"I protested in vain against his attitude, and when we quarreled over the matter he ordered me to pack up my belongings and leave."

"I went upstairs to pack up, but it was a revolver I packed up, not a suitcase. I then went downstairs to the dining-room. I intended to give him a chance to confess and repent before I killed him, but as I advanced into the room with the hand holding the pistol extended, I saw him grab for a salt cellar to throw at me and I fired one shot and then twice. MEETING CHRIST IS BIG QUESTION OF LIFE, SAYS BULGIN

Character Only Thing That Counts—Parable of Ten Virgins Explained.

"If Jesus came tonight, would you be prepared to meet him?" asked Dr. E. J. Bulgin, evangelist at Cade Tabernacle, in a sermon Thursday night on "The Parable of the Ten Virgins."

"Are you ready? That is the biggest question I can put to you."

Recounting the Biblical parable, the evangelist asked, "Have you the real oil, or are you like the five bad virgins?"

"The oil which the five bad virgins lacked represents the thing that fits you and me for the coming of Jesus Christ," Dr. Bulgin said. "It represents true Christian character."

Character Counts
"It isn't what you do, but what you are that counts the soul. The very plowing of a farmer is sin if he is unprepared."

"As a tree falleth so must it lie. There is no repentance after death. If Sabbath bells won't bring you to God, what chance will you have in the blackness of hell?"

"Opportunity does not make the man. It did not make Honest Abe Lincoln. He was Honest Abe long before God called him to pilot his people in time of stress."

"Character is revealed, not made, in a crisis."

Religious Hiding Scored
"They say Jefferson Davis, when he was captured, was found disguised in woman's clothes. Lots of you men are trying to go to Heaven by hiding under your wife's religious petticoats."

"You can divide money, but not character and patience. That is why the five good virgins could not divide their oil with the other five."

Bulgin answered critics of the church by denying the church is infested with hypocrites.

He replied to arguments of Ingels and others attempting to discredit the Bible by picking flaws in the Parable of the Ten Virgins.

MAYOR OPPOSED TO NEW MARKET HOUSE FOR CITY

Shank Believes Tax Levy Now Would Be Too Heavy—Repairs Contemplated.

Mayor Shank today expressed the opinion that he was not in favor of building a new market at the present time.

"The old one can be repaired and put in a sanitary condition, but I do not believe that the city is in the position to spend the amount required for a new building," the mayor said.

Mayor Shank has stated that the present market house would be painted and repaired in the near future.

An amended report recommending construction of a \$1,000,000 market building in place of the \$2,000,000 building as originally planned was submitted to the city administration Thursday by the citizens' market committee, headed by John E. White.

White submitted the report in a conference with members of the board of safety, board of works, City Controller Joseph L. Hogue, Market Master Robert R. Sloan and Councilmen Walter W. Wise and Heydon W. Buchanan.

The new plans call for only a market house, while the original plans were for a market house and auditorium combined.

It was agreed at the conference that a new building should be built or the present market repaired and put in a sanitary condition.

Charles E. Coffin, president of the works board, promised that the present building would be repaired immediately in case the new structure is not favored.

FIRE DAMAGE DISPUTED

Loss of McDaniel Printing Company Fixed at \$2,000 to \$5,000.

Firemen and J. L. McDaniel, owner of the McDaniel Printing Company, 403 Wulfin building, today differed on the loss suffered by the company in a fire discovered in the press room late Thursday afternoon. Firemen said that the blaze was extinguished without spreading and that a smoke loss would not exceed \$2,000. McDaniel, said loss of a supply of freshly-printed, numerically numbered tickets would mount the loss to \$5,000. An automatic sprinkler system kept the fire from becoming serious, firemen said.

Motorman Charged With Failure to Stop for Fire Trucks.
