## REVENUE EMPLOYEES CUT

Appropriation for Indiana Office Reduced \$25,381.

The personnel of the Indiana office of internal revenue collection will be cut fifteen to twenty employees, because of a \$25,381 reduction in the appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1. M. Bert Thurman, collector of internal revenue, said today. The national appropriation has been cut \$3,568,090, Thurman was notified. He said he would reduce the personnel rather than cut salaries.

ister, continues to preach from the pulpit of First Presbyterian Church, New York City, he must preach doctrines which conform to Presbyterian standards.

### Minority Report Adopted

The assembly decided this action late Wednesday in voting to accept a minority report of the bills and overtures committee on the "Philadelphia overture" which condemned Fosdick. The New York presbytery was instructed to report at the general assembly convention in 1924.

### Bryan Triumphant

The minority report was presented by Rev. A. Gordon MacLennan, pastor of the Bethany Presbyterian

Church, Philadelphia, as a member of the bills and overtures committee. Out of a committee of twenty-two, he was the only one who refused to sign the majority report.

His chief help in winning support came from William Jennings Bryan and Dr. Clarence E. Macartney, moderator of the Philadelphia presbytery which sent the protest against the preaching of Dr. Fosdick.

"This victory wipes out all my defeats," Bryan said. "It opens the way to a return to the gospel which the common people will hear as gladly as they heard Christ."

After two standing votes on the question of whether the MacLennan minority report should be substituted for the majority report, Moderator Wishart declared his inability to determine the vote. Then, for the first time in twenty years, a roll call was

asked for on a doctrinal question. The minority report won, 439 to 369.

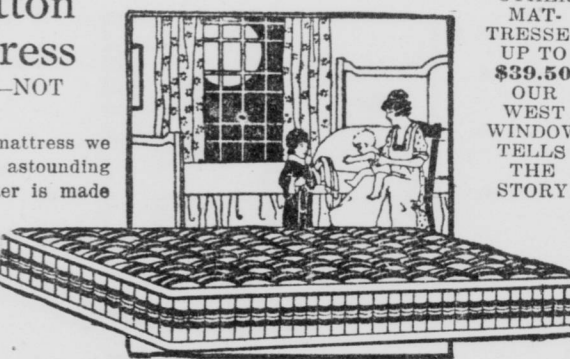
