## GOVERNOR SMITH IS SILENT ON NEW YORK RUM CASE

Executive Will Sign or Veto  
Dry Repealer by Satur-  
day Midnight.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 1.—Governor Al Smith, as judge and jury, took the case of prohibition under advisement today.

Before Sunday midnight he will sign or veto the repealer of the State enforcement act passed by the Legislature, sign and make himself leader of the wet faction in the national Democratic party, or veto and abandon the cause of Tammany Hall.

The evidence in the case was presented in final arguments of wet and dry leaders during a five-hour hearing in the assembly chamber Thursday. The thirty-day period in which he is permitted to act on the repealing bill, expires Sunday midnight. In view of doubt over whether it is ethical or logical to act on Sunday the Governor is expected to make known his decision by midnight Saturday.

There is no definite information as to what action the Governor will take. Presence of some of the Tammany leaders in Albany gave hopes to wets that their pressure might be exerted on the governor to sign the repealer.

Dry followers, however, were convinced their arguments had won over the executive to the dry viewpoint.

The Governor himself has refused to express to his closest friends any indication of his action. A speech he made a week ago in Coney Island in which he said he "would enforce the law," no matter whether some of his friends liked it or not, is the only vague comment he has made.

I firmly believe that, given half a chance, the right place for little Jay is with his mother. No one can take a mother's place."

## Expresses Sympathy

Mrs. Stillman expressed sympathy for Mrs. Leeds, especially for Mrs. Leeds' campaign against the banker, but she indicated she must always remain aloof from any direct relations with Jay's mother.

"I am not now and never have been jealous—I bear her no ill will—but I could never recognize her in any personal or social sense," stated Mrs. Stillman.

Mrs. Stillman's summer home at Grand Anse is here in a rambling, old white farm house in a little clearing overlooking the blue Saint Maurice River. Thirty miles of almost trackless "bush" stretch between Grand Anse and La Tuque. Here in entire seclusion Mrs. Stillman has been resting and recuperating from a recent minor operation.

Mrs. Stillman smiled and laughed frequently and seemed in better health and spirits than at any time since before the trial.

## POWER USERS TO VISIT NEW PLANT

Merchants Heat and Light Co. Provides Special Train.

Three hundred power users, merchants and professional men of Indianapolis today were invited by the Merchants Heat and Light Company to visit the site of the new Central Indiana Power Company super hydro-electric plant, six miles south of Terre Haute, June 14 on a special train.

The train will leave the Union Station at 7:45 a. m., but guests have been urged to get on at 7:15 for breakfast.

Work on the plant, which will serve customers of seven utilities in central Indiana, merged in the new company, was started in December and is said to be well under way. The company intends to have equipment of 40,000 kilowatt connected load capacity by Jan. 1.

## ONLY TINY WORLD LIMITS VIEWS OF GLOBE TROTTERS

Four Dusty Tourists in Auto Measure Distance by Broad Continents.

With the tale of adventure in nearly every country of the world on their lips, and bound for "Out West," four dusty globe trotters, representing the World's champions, are in Indianapolis today for a short stay, in an auto bearing the name of every important city of the world.

They are: Nell Wanderwell, pilot; Fanny Kaufman, "cameraman"; Shirley West, secretary, and Rex Risher, mechanic.

They represent Unit No. 1 of the Wanderwells, noted family of adventurers, which is now in a contest with Unit No. 2 to see which one can cover the most territory and visit the most countries in five years.

They started Sept. 22, 1919, from Atlanta, Ga. Unit No. 2 is in Spain. The speedometer of the Wanderwell car registers 167,593 miles.

They measure their distance by continents not by countries. States of the Union? They have been in all of them—many times.
