

G. O. P. POLITICIANS OUTNUMBER ALL IN EDITORIAL MEETING

Candidates for State Offices
Greet Scribes With Hand-
shakes and Talks.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., June 7.—Hundreds of politicians and a number of editors were gathering here today for the annual summer meeting of the Indiana Republican Editorial Association. The meeting is the biggest G. O. P. event of the summer.

About half the politicians appear to be candidates or at least possibilities, according to their friends.

About half the candidates for Gov-

ernor are Eds, not editors, but Edwards, Edgars, and Edmunds. For instance, there are Ed Jackson, Edward C. Toner, Edgar D. Bush, Edmund Wasmuth and Ed Bowen.

Shank Mentioned.

Among other names there are those of Mayor Shank, Newman T. Miller, State fire marshal; former Congressman James W. Dunbar and Raymond C. Morgan, speaker of the House. Others probably will be mentioned as the convention develops.

Visitors were arriving on every train and in automobiles. No program was scheduled until tonight, the day being taken up with registration.

A dinner will be held in the Tribune Building tonight. F. A. Miller, editor of the Tribune, will preside. Eli F. Seebert, mayor of South Bend, will deliver an address of welcome, and George A. Elliott, vice president of the editorial association, will reply.




