FRANCE DEMANDS RUHR RESISTANCE CEASE AT ONCE

Poincare Declares Sabotage Must Stop Before Agreement on Reparations.

PARIS, June 8.—France sent to Germany today a strongly worded note demanding resistance to the inter-allied military control commissions cease immediately.

Premier Poincare will communicate with the other allies regarding the advisability of replying to the latest German reparations offer, but in the meantime has made it clear to Germany that the latter's policy of sabotage and resistance must end before any agreement can be reached.

The inter-allied commissions will resume at once surveillance of German military organizations.

After the occupation of the Ruhr, Germany disclaimed responsibility for possible attacks upon the commissioners.

The French cabinet will meet tomorrow to discuss the reparations situation.

Premier Poincare favors a policy of completely ignoring the Cuno proposal.

English and British interests, however, believe some sort of reply should be made and Poincare may be pressed to their view by the desire to present a united allied front.

On the other hand Italy is understood to join the British and the Belgians in the belief the newest German offer is at least more conciliatory than any previous proposal.

BODY OF WOMAN FOUND IN CULVERT

Was Fashionably Dressed—Anonymous Note Is Clew.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, June 8.—A fashionably-dressed body of a woman was taken from beneath a culvert near here today following receipt of an anonymous note to police.

Marks on the body indicated the woman had fought desperately with her slayer.

Sheriff Donahue believes it to be a "plain case of murder" and the body placed in its watery crypt some time after the slaying.

The body was clad in a gray dress, gray shoes and stockings and a gray fur.

Handwriting experts were immediately put to work on the anonymous letter.

CREWS SAVED AS TWO SHIPS WRECK

Both Vessels Pile on Reefs in Double Sea Disaster.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 8.—Crews of two ships, victims of a double disaster on the hidden rocks near Chikof Island, 100 miles south of the Alaskan peninsula, were saved today by the U. S. S. supply ship, Cuyama.

The mine-sweeper Cardinal and the survey ship Discoverer were both wrecked when wind-lashed waves dashed over the vessels on Rocky Reefs.

The Cardinal piled up on the rocks late yesterday and it was apparent she might become a total loss. The Discoverer answered her calls for aid and met the same fate.

Early today radio advised the crew of the two vessels safely in small boats. A total of 135 men were aboard the ships.

ANOTHER THEORY IN M'GROARTY DEATH

Relatives Do Not Believe Park Secretary Drowned Self.

Miss Sadie McGroarty, secretary of the park board, whose body was found Monday in Niagara River below Niagara Falls, did not meet death by her own hands, according to a telegram received by Mrs. Hubert S. Riley, sister of Miss McGroarty, from her husband, at Buffalo, today.

Mrs. Riley said this conclusion was based upon the facts that there was no outer clothing on the body when it was found and that more than \$100 which Miss McGroarty had with her had disappeared.

The body will arrive in Indianapolis Saturday. The funeral will be held Monday at 9 a. m. at St. John's Catholic Church. Burial will be in Holy Cross Cemetery.

Due to the identity of the body was removed late Friday when positive identification was made by Riley.

Miss McGroarty, who had been in ill health for a long time, disappeared more than month ago.

DROWNING VICTIM IS UNIDENTIFIED

Body of Man Found Floating In Fall Creek.

Efforts to identify the body of the man drowned in Fall Creek had been unsuccessful today.

A number of persons visited the funeral parlors of Royster & Askins, 317 N. Illinois St., Thursday night and today in an attempt to identify the body.

The dead man was described as six feet high and weighing 160 pounds. He had long, straight, black hair. He had brown eyes. His teeth were regular. There were no scars, moles, warts or tattoo marks on the body.

The feet were unusually small for a man his size. This age was estimated at 22 to 26 years. His hands bore no evidence of hard work.

Walton Carter, 1526 Bryum Ave., discovered the nude body floating in Fall Creek near Thirty-Fourth St. late Thursday.

Motor Police Heller and Pettit recovered the body.

George Edwards, 2233 Yandies St., said he was fishing Tuesday and saw clothing on the bank of Fall Creek. The clothing included a blue serge suit, silk shirt, low black shoes, and black hat. Police failed to find the clothes.

The body appeared to have been in the water for some time.

This is the third drowning during the week. Last year eleven persons were drowned while swimming in streams of Marion County.

EGG SHIPMENTS TO EAST

Indiana Ranks Third in States With 226,323 Cases.

Indiana sent 726,323 cases (thirty dozen) of eggs to New York last year, according to a statement of the New York Bank of America. This was the third largest shipment by States. Illinois sent 1,378,846 cases and Iowa 921,046.

White eggs are preferred to brown in New York. New Yorkers are willing to pay an average of 10 cents more on a dozen for white eggs, the statement said.


