

GAMING CHARGES AND LIQUOR KEEP POLICEMEN BUSY

Raids Over Week-end Cause
Arrest of 123 Men and
28 Women.

One hundred and twenty-three men and twenty-eight women were arrested during the forty-eight hours ending at 6 a. m. today.

Nineteen men and three women were charged with operating a blind tiger. Twenty-one men and three women were charged with drunkenness. Eighteen men were charged with gambling. Five women and six men were charged with statutory offenses.

No Luvane, 23, of 2160 N. Capitol Ave., was charged with keeping a resort. Lieutenant Jones arrested five men and five women in the raid. They were held on statutory charges.

Poolroom Raided

Lieutenant McGee raided Ed Graves' poolroom at 1014 E. Washington St. and arrested Graves on the charge of keeping a gambling house. Five men in the room were charged with visiting a gambling house and gaming. Three men escaped through the rear door. A pair of dice and \$6 was obtained as evidence.

William Hasselberg, rear of 1317 W. Michigan St.; Henry Hasselberg of the same address, and William H. Stafford, 421 S. Harding St., were under arrest today on blind tiger charges. Lieutenant Corrigan and Sergeant O'Connor said they found two pints of "white mule" in a garage. The men ran. None of them would claim the liquor, police said.

Blind Tiger Alleged

Pete Louis and George Trifon, 402 W. Maryland St., were charged with operating a blind tiger. The same officers said they found three bottles of "white mule" in their restaurant.

Fifty-nine quarts of home-made beer caused the arrest of Ira Steth, colored, 312 Smith St., who was charged with operating a blind tiger. The raid was made by Lieutenant Winkler.

AIRMAN FAINTS, BUT RECOVERS AND LANDS

Plane Tumbles Earthward From 9,000
Meters. But Is Righted.

BRITISH DESTROYER SEIZES TURK SHIP

Transport Loaded With Arms From
Thrace Captured.


Baptist Pastors to Meet
