

ANDERSON IS HIGH AND 'DRY' AFTER U. S. AGENTS' RAID

Eighteen Operators of 'Soft' Drink Parlors Held for Liquor Sales.

Anderson was a dryer, tighter town today than it has been for many years, according to Federal officials.

Twenty-one owners and operators of eighteen "soft" drink places, where, according to Federal prohibition agents, intoxicating liquor was dispensed, were arrested Thursday by Fred T. Cretors and William Garbrant, deputy United States marshals.

Arrests were made on criminal informations charging sale of liquor and maintenance of a nuisance, filed by Homer Elliott, United States district attorney.

Those arrested: Vernon Hiles, Jeff Brooks, Wilfred Clemons, Fred R. Brown, James Pierce, John Butler, Lige Northcott, Frank Peters, Michael Tobin, Dave Kindoff, Lee Talmadge, D. S. Gakbraith, Speck Carpenter, Tom Dunn, Harry Rosenfield, Lester Brooks, Herschel C. Feiler, James Goff and Albert Abel, all of Anderson, and Earl Hoel and Squire Palmer, both of Markleville.

One defendant, Frank Melcher, could not be found. All gave bond of \$1,000 for their appearance before Judge Albert B. Anderson in Federal Court June 27, except Clemons and Brooks. They were brought to Indianapolis and placed in jail.

Walker Tells Janitors How to Sweep Walks.

Downtown merchants today were asked by John F. Walker, superintendent of street cleaning, to stop sweeping trash from sidewalks into the streets. Policemen carried the request.

During warm months street cleaners start flushing downtown streets at 4 a. m. to get through before the automobile rush is on. Many janitors have been sweeping sidewalk trash into the streets after the flushers are through, so that by 9 a. m. it is hard to tell the pavements have been cleaned, Walker said.

"We can keep the streets looking much better if merchants will have their janitors put the sweepings in the corner trash boxes," Walker said.

The lease provided for the erection of a new building to cost not less than \$250,000 prior to 1943.
