

AMERICANIZATION PROGRAM BEFORE STATE ATTORNEYS

Bar Association Opens Annual Meeting at West Baden.

Adoption of an Americanization program for Indiana is expected to be one of the important results of the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the State Bar Association which opens at West Baden at 2 p. m. today, according to George H. Backe, Indianapolis, secretary.

A committee of the association, which has been working for several months, has drafted a bill to provide for compulsory education in public schools and proposes that lawyers in every county be asked to speak before constitutional government classes.

President Cassius G. Shirley, Indianapolis, was to open the meeting. William Marshall Bullitt, Louisville, will speak at the annual banquet to-night.

Speakers for Friday are Judge Louis B. Ewbank of the Indiana Supreme Court; Judge James A. Collins of Marion County Criminal Court and Elmer L. Lockyear, Evansville.

MAYOR ATTEMPTS TO BLOCK WATER PLANT

Bloomington Situation May Not Be Remedied Soon.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., July 5.—The water situation which has been a great handicap to the city may not be alleviated in the near future if the opposition of Mayor John G. Harris and residents of the Spring Creek valley is successful. A remonstrance against issuance of bonds for a new plant, signed by the mayor and residents of that section, will be presented to the State tax board.

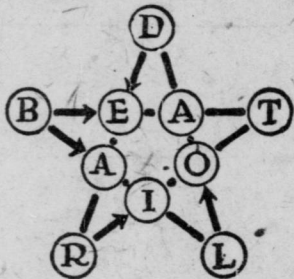

DEMPSEY-GIBBONS FIGHT IS SCORED

Citizenship Conference Delegates Register Disapproval.

WINONA LAKE, Ind., July 5.—The Dempsey-Gibbons fight, at Shelby, Mont., was denounced by speakers at the citizenship conference on Christian citizenship Wednesday.

Christians of the Nation should protest against such desecration of a holiday, they declared. About ten thousand persons crowded the Billy Sunday tabernacle to hear an address on "Loyalty to Country and to Country's God" by William Jennings Bryan. Bryan roundly scored Governor Al Smith, New York.

"It is no test of a citizen's loyalty to obey the laws he likes; law is not needed to compel a person to do what he wants to do, for he does that without law," Bryan declared. "The wets have recently come from under cover and disclosed their real purposes, which is to paralyze enforcement. They have raised an issue never before known in this country, namely law or lawlessness."

Turning to the matter of education, Bryan said, "Teachers in public schools, drawing pay from taxation, have undermined faith in God as well as faith in the Bible and in Christ."

Miss Edna Hedges Seized and Choked While on Way Home.

Seized and dragged into an alley, Miss Edna Hedges, 15, of 1415 Silver Ave., was attacked by a colored man early today. Sergeant Wilkerson and a police emergency squad found Miss Hedges, her clothing almost torn from her body at 1313 Kentucky Ave. She was covered with mud. Her neck showed choke marks. She was taken home.

When Sergeant Wilkerson called police headquarters on arrival at the scene, Capt. Frank Row rushed night riders to the neighborhood.

Miss Hedges told police she was stopped while on her way home from work at Riverside Amusement Park, having obtained employment for the Fourth. She left a street car at Kentucky Ave. and York St. at 12:30 a. m. She believes the colored man was on the same car.

On York St., between Kentucky and Silver Aves., the colored man approached her and said: "Where is Capitol Ave?" She answered, "It is a long way from here." Then he seized her.

She fought, and screamed. Her assailant choked her, his fingernails cutting deep scratches in her throat. She was dragged into the alley and thrown into the mud.
