Here are some additional sug-
gestions:

Electric Red Lights With Traffic Order

I suggest that red lights on con-
crete markers be electric and rest on
top of markers in order to bring them
about the same height as the tail
lights on automobiles. Said concrete
markers should be black and white
striped, similar to safety gates at
railroad crossings.

One side of the globes on the street
lights should read "Truth." A sign on
the blank side should read "Keep to
the Right, Police Order," which would
freshen the memory of the pedestrian.
There would be no unnecessary con-
gestion, loitering on sidewalks or cor-
ners, especially during rush hours.

There should be concrete platforms
in safety zones at Capitol Ave., Me-
ridian and Pennsylvania Sts.

Safety Rod On Fender

I suggest that automobiles be
equipped with a safety rod across
front of car fastened on fenders,
which would give pedestrians some-
thing to grab in case of accidents.
There is such a device on the market.

Also adopt a law that all automob-
iles be equipped with a speed gov-
ernor that would not allow them to
exceed city or State law speed. If
we stop high speed it will reduce ac-
cidents.

Signals and Signs to Guide Walkers

Where traffic policemen are required,
pedestrians should be guided by sig-
nals and signs similar to the vehicu-
lar traffic signals and signs. There
should be street car traffic designated
to move exclusively for a time limit
designated by the traffic policeman,
a vehicular traffic movement and a pe-
destrian traffic movement. The pe-
destrian traffic movement is very con-
gested by the right-turn privilege of
the autolite. The solution is to allow
the pedestrian time enough at war-
ranted intervals to go from one side
of the street to the other along a com-
plete zone of safety, instead of jump-
ing from one zone to another and get-

PUBLIC UTILITIES GIVE DEFENSE OF RATES IN INDIANA

Association Expresses Sur-
prise at Investigations
Planned by Commission.

Surprise at announcement of the
public service commission of a sweep-
ing investigation into utility rates
and valuations in Indiana is expressed
in a statement issued today by the
committee on public utility informa-
tion of the Indiana Public Utility As-
sociation.

Faith in the principle of State regu-
lation of utilities and confidence in
the commission are expressed. The
statement says the committee knows
of no utility making excessive profit.

The statement, in part:
"This committee was somewhat
surprised at the decision, of the com-
mission to make a sweeping in-
vestigation into Indiana utility rates
and valuations. It was surprised,
also, to find that a number of busi-
ness men believed such an in-
vestigation necessary. The fact is
that Indiana utility rates are lower
than rates in most States, and lower
than the average throughout the
country. But production costs are
no lower in Indiana than elsewhere.

This being true, utility executives in
other States for the last five years
have been asking Indiana operators
how they manage to give good service
to their patrons, and at the same
time to give their owners and in-
vestors any earnings.


