

LOUISVILLE MAN HEADS BAPTISTS

Dr. E. Y. Mullins Elected President of World Alliance.

STOCKHOLM, July 26.—Dr. E. Y. Mullins, Louisville, was elected president of the Baptist World Alliance today to succeed the late Dr. R. S. McArthur, who died last February.

Dr. Mullins is a native of Mississippi and a graduate of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, of which institution he has been president since 1919. He has been an editor and foreign mission secretary at various times in his career and is the author of many books dealing with the philosophy of religion.

In May, 1921, he was elected president of the Southern Baptist convention, which office he now holds.

French Beauty Plays Title Role in New Movie Version of Du Maurier's 'Trilby'

Richard Walton Tully's production of "Trilby," released by First National, will open a week's engagement Sunday at the Circle.

Several months were spent in Europe by Mr. Tully, during which time he actually took many thousands of feet of negative on the identical spots and in the very locations described by the author.

"I experienced a great deal of difficulty," Tully said, "in finding many of the exact locales and buildings described in the story, because of Du Maurier's habit of camouflaging or changing the names of the places he described."

"For instance," he continued, "the square in which the three chums of the story dwelt, was called the 'Aristotele des Arts' by the author, and I finally found it to be in reality, the 'André des Arts.' The 'Cirque Bashibazouk,' in reality was the 'Cirque Boom Boom,' now called 'Cirque Medrano,' and still in use as a theater.

"We used four thousand performers in these theater sequences, all in costume, and the result more than justified the effort. No American audience could have been satisfactor-

ily substituted, as the 'atmosphere' would have plainly shown its artificiality," he said.

Every scene in this elaborate production of "Trilby" was made under the personal supervision of Richard Walton Tully, whose stage productions have made his name a by-word in America. James Young, the master-director, whose work on the two former Tully cinema successes, "The Masquerader" and "Omar, the Tentmaker," will long be remembered, also directed "Trilby," for which he was regularly qualified, owing to his vast knowledge of all things European, and the long list of really great photographs to his credit.

Andree Lafayette was brought from France to play the title role of "Trilby." Arthur Edmund Carey plays in the difficult role of "Svengali." The balance of the cast includes Creighton Hale as Little Billie, Wilfred Lucas as the Laird, Philo McCollough as Taft, Francis McDonald as Geeko, Maurice Cannon as Zouzou, Max Constant as Dodo and others. Besides those mentioned, Gertrude Olmstead, Gordon Muller, Ross Dione, Martha Franklin, Evelyn Sherman and more of like reputation appear in parts for

which they were chosen after most careful consideration.

160 BODIES TAKEN FROM RAIL CRASH

Bulgarian Wreck Takes Toll of 200 Killed, 300 Injured.

SOFIA, July 26.—One hundred and sixty bodies have been recovered from the splintered wreckage of two Bulgarian express trains which crashed between Sofia and Varna Monday.

Two hundred persons were killed and 300 injured. Wrecking crews are still searching the tangled fragments of the two trains for bodies.

Faulty signaling is understood to have been responsible for the crash, in which an engine and eleven coaches were derailed and flattened by contact. From ten coaches no one

escaped alive and dozens of victims were unrecognizable and mutilated under the grinding frame work of the wooden cars. The collision occurred near Plevna.
