\$2,500 FOR DOGS IS ASKED IN SUIT

Saltzgaber's Kennel Partner Sued by Estate.

The value of three bulldogs, estimated at \$2,500, and alleged to have been part of the estate of Baird G. Saltzgaber, who killed himself and his wife Aug. 12, 1922, is the basis for a suit on bond for \$2,500 filed in Superior Court Wednesday.

Willis Henkel, 3103 N. Meridian St., and Arthur J. Randall, 5860 E. St. Clair St., administrators of the estate, brought the action against James H. Sullivan, 1906 Lexington St. The United States Fidelity and Guaranty

Company of Maryland is named as bondholder.

Sullivan, according to the complaint, was a partner of Saltzgaber in a private undertaking, the Warleigh Kennels. Upon Saltzgaber's death, Sullivan gave \$1,000 bond.

The plaintiffs allege that three valuable dogs were not listed in the inventory of the kennel assets which Sullivan filed.

"Sensible Freddie," one of the dogs, is valued in the complaint at \$2,000. The other dogs are "Pressgang," rated at \$200, and "Goytside Demand," at \$300.

The suit is set for trial Sept. 10-11.
