## 'ABATEMENT LIES IN FIRING METHOD'

Prof. Cole of Purdue Points  
Out Inspector's Problem.

"The great problem the Indianapolis smoke inspector has before him is to get the people to use new efficiency methods in firing furnaces," asserted Prof. A. W. Cole, head of the mechanical engineering department of Purdue University, Wednesday night in an illustrated lecture on "Engineering Phases of Smoke Problems" at the Chamber of Commerce.

There should be official approval of all installation of boilers," said Professor Cole. Throughout the State I find most commercial equipment antiquated, poorly installed and ignorantly operated. Boiler rooms in factories are dirty and unkept. Firemen throughout the State are thoroughly disgusted with their working conditions."
