Down-the-Stretch Battle for Net Title Reaches Climax This Week—Iowa Meets Purdue Tonight.

The Saturday night defeats of Ohio State and Chicago made the race tighter than sardines in a can. At present Chicago and Purdue are tied for the lead with seven games won and three lost.

The race belongs to most anybody the way things are going now. Three games are on the program tonight. Iowa is at Purdue in an important clash.

The Boilermakers can go into the lead with a victory. Ohio State closes its season with a game at Wisconsin.

LOCAL VICTOR TO MEET RICHMOND

Fifty-Two Teams Left for Regional Tours.

Fifty-two high school basketball teams have passed through the first severe test in their quest for the State title on last Friday and Saturday. The net step is the regional tournaments at Richmond, Bloomington, Lafayette and Ft. Wayne, where thirteen teams compete at each center on next Friday and Saturday.

Out of 665 contestants fifty-two have survived. By the old method of the survival of the fittest the field has been narrowed down. On next Saturday night sixteen teams will be left to the running to come to Indianapolis to fight for the high school championship on March 14 and 15 at the Coliseum, State fairground.

Southport, the winner of the local sectional, was hard at work today preparing for its supreme test when it meets Richmond in the regional meet at Richmond gym on next Saturday at 2 p. m.

Southport defeated Broad Ripple, Beech Grove and Technical on the final day of the sectional to take the title. Tech was defeated in an overtime affair that was a thriller, to 35.
