

## BOY KILLED, FIVE PERSONS INJURED IN AUTO CRASHES

Child, 6, Run Down by Machine—Car Burns Up Following Collision.

One death and five injured persons were the result of two collisions on Thursday night.

Earl Thomas Hinton, 6, colored, of 1659 Martindale Ave., was killed almost instantly when struck by an auto driven by Ralph Jackson, 21, of 618 N. Meridian St., driver for the Indiana Taxi Company.

The accident took place in the 1700 block, Correll Ave. Witnesses said the boy ran from behind his father's auto into the street. Dr. E. C. Tolles, deputy coroner, ordered Jackson held on a manslaughter charge.

When autos driven by John Cruz, 35, of 1511 Olive St., and Otha Gentry, 29, of 1761 Howard St., collided at Harding and Raymond Sts., both cars turned over and Gentry's auto burned up. Both drivers were charged with assault and battery by Sergt. Dean and emergency squad.

William Martin, 32 and his wife Cora, 30, of 538 River Ave., in the Gentry auto, were cut and bruised. Mrs. Martin was also burned about the arms. They were taken to the city hospital. Mrs. Gentry and five children ranging from 3 months to 7 years were all rescued from the flames and were uninjured.

Mrs. Rachel Craig, wife of Craig, and a niece, Miss Lizzie Temperly, of Illinois, were slightly injured. Two others in the car escaped injury.

Alden Cook, Puritan Hotel, received a scalp wound when an auto in which he was riding with G. P. Smith, 3552 N. Pennsylvania St., collided with a truck driven by Joe L. Jones, 2704 E. Sixteenth St., at White River bridge and Washington St.
