

STATE ROAD TO  
LEBANON TO BE  
OPEN BY OCTOBER

Two Miles Remains to Be  
Paved, Director Wil-  
liams Says.

Indications are that traffic may  
use new pavement between Indianapolis and Lebanon by the first week  
in October. John D. Williams, State  
highway director, said today.

Williams pointed out that less than  
two miles remain to be paved, and  
allowing twenty-one days for proper  
curing, the whole road should be  
ready for traffic soon after Oct. 1.

At this time traffic can use ap-  
proximately nineteen miles of new  
pavement on this road by detouring  
around a bridge at Flackville and  
at the end of pavement some three  
miles southeast of Lebanon. The  
Flackville bridge will be opened by  
the time the last of the new pave-  
ment is ready for use.

Road conditions:

No. 1 (New Albany, Indianapolis,  
South Bend, Michigan line)—Paved  
from Indianapolis to Kokomo but traffic  
should drive carefully over three road-  
side run-arounds at bridge projects near  
Tipton. Between Kokomo and Tipton  
is a marked detour north of Kokomo via  
Bunker Hill account construction between  
Kokomo and Peru. South of Indianapolis  
and between Detour between Seymour  
and Crothersville account construction  
near upper Muscatine River. Detour  
between Indianapolis and Tipton and  
between Perry and Sellersburg.

No. 3 (Terre Haute, Indianapolis, Bi-  
rmingham, Kokomo, Indianapolis, Cam-  
bridge City). One way bridge at Putnam-  
ville. Narrow grade at Glenn, three miles  
east of Terre Haute. One way bridge at  
Greensburg, Indiana.

No. 6 (Madison, Greenburg, Indianapolis,  
Oxford)—By detour at bridge at Flackville  
and at about mile 12, leaving Indianapolis via N. Meridian  
and crossing bridge over Springmill road.

No. 15 (Indianapolis, Logansport, Mich-  
igan line)—Due to Marion County paving  
leaving Indianapolis via N. Meridian  
and crossing bridge over Springmill road to detour. Follow detour  
to No. 15. Detour at two and one-  
half miles south of Marion and one and  
one-half miles southeast of New Berlin to  
Shepherdsville. Detour at one and one-  
half miles south of New Berlin to  
Shepherdsville. Detour at junction of Road 4  
for repairing pavement.

No. 17 (Vincennes, Spencer, Martins-  
ville, Indianapolis)—Drive slow at bridge  
run-around at four miles south of Free-  
dom.

No. 15 (Indianapolis, Logansport, Mich-  
igan line)—Due to Marion County paving  
leaving Indianapolis via N. Meridian  
and crossing bridge over Springmill road to detour. Follow detour  
to No. 15. Detour at two and one-  
half miles south of Marion and one and  
one-half miles southeast of New Berlin to  
Shepherdsville. Detour at junction of Road 4  
for repairing pavement.

No. 15 (Indianapolis, Martinsville, Indianapolis,  
Oxford)—Through traffic use No. 12 between  
Indianapolis and Martinsville as No. 15 be-  
tween Indianapolis and Martinsville north of Bloom-  
ington, detour bad. Closed between Oolite  
and Bedford account street paving, detour  
to No. 15. Detour at one and one-half miles south of  
Harrodsburg. Avoid if possible. Bridge project  
south of Harrodsburg.
