

DEMOCRATIC AND G. O. P. QUARTERS UNDERGO CHANGE

Walb and Chambers to Be Retained as State Chairmen.

State Democratic and Republican headquarters were being dismantled today preparatory to setting up permanent organizations to hold sway during the next two years.

Both Clyde A. Walb, Republican State chairman, and Walter S. Chambers, Democratic State chairman, will hold their positions at least during the next two years.

Democratic State headquarters, in charge of Miss Gertrude Fanning McHugh, will be retained at the Claypool.

Republican headquarters will be maintained at the Severin at least until after Jan. 1 when it is expected permanent headquarters will be established in an office building.

Mrs. Vivian T. Wheatcraft, State vice chairman, will spend the next few weeks until Thanksgiving at her home in Whiteland, Ind., and will then take charge of State headquarters. She probably could have a State appointment, but it is said to be the plan to keep her with the State committee.

Dick Bruene, who has been in charge of supplies and assistant secretary of the committee, has entered the garage business and opened a storage garage at the rear of 127 N. Georgia St.

Disposition of Gaylord Morton, auditor of the committee, Elmer Hungerford, head of the farm bureau; Luke Schneider, publicity department; Ben Inman, poll and registration bureau; Paul Miller of the veterans bureau; C. C. Reeder, first voters, and E. C. Tedrington, colored bureau, is a matter of speculation. Morton and Rozelle will be Walb appointees. The rest were Jackson men. Walb and Mrs. Wheatcraft claim privilege of putting their approval on any petitions for State jobs.

Mrs. Allen T. Fleming, assistant to Henry Roberts as head of the traveling men's bureau, seeks an appointment. Roberts is Statehouse custodian.

Detectives Have Clues in Plainfield Hold-Up

Detectives are working today on several clues as to the identity of the bandit trio who held up the First National Bank of Plainfield, Ind., late Wednesday, forced six persons into the vault and escaped with \$3,500 in currency and silver.

Local police say they were informed that one of the bandits was in a local garage Sunday and had the oil in his machine changed, telling the employee that he intended to make a long trip. The man said that he "was flat" and was going to make some money soon.

Shortly before 4 p. m. two well-dressed young men entered the bank and at point of guns forced Chester G. Pike, cashier, C. M. Havens, vice

president; Ralph J. Blye, assistant cashier; Miss Margaret Harvey, bookkeeper; Harry E. Wilson, a merchant, and another customer, behind the grill door of the vault. While one of the bandits kept the six behind the door, the other scooped up the contents of several money tills under the counter. After looting the tills, the bandit commanded Blye to hand over some of the money in the vault. Blye gave him about \$2,500.

The two ran from the bank and, jumping into a large touring car manned by the third member of the gang, they sped toward Indianapolis.

Sgt. Ralph Dean and squad answered the call for aid and covered the National R. Police believe that the trio doubled back and headed westward toward Terre Haute.

O. T. Hancock of Plainfield, who was standing near the bank at the time of the robbery, said that he saw the men at work, but was unable to spread the alarm until they left. The license number of the machine given to local police corresponds to one on the machine of Francis Montgomery, 3214 N. New Jersey St., which was stolen here early Wednesday.

STATE RETURNS GIVE COOLIDGE 210,000 LEAD

Official Figures Indicate 85,000 Plurality for Jackson.

With only a few scattering precincts still out President Coolidge held a lead of about 210,000 over John W. Davis in Indiana, according to official returns. The Coolidge landslide exceeded that of Harding in the 1920 campaign by about 25,000. Running far behind Coolidge, Ed Jackson's plurality over Dr. Carleton B. McCulloch, Democratic candidate for Governor, will be about \$5,000.

The entire Republican State ticket with the possible exception of Judge Benjamin Willoughby, candidate for the Supreme Court of the Fourth district, also was elected. George Denton, Democratic candidate, was steadily cutting down Willoughby's early lead and the outcome was in doubt. Willoughby was opposed by the Ku-Klux Klan and the Anti-Saloon League.

Schortemeier Favorite
Fred Schortemeier, candidate for Secretary of State, led the Republican State ticket with a tremendous popular vote and a plurality of about 120,000.

The Republicans also gained two seats in Congress, the next Indiana delegations standing ten Republicans and three Democrats. The First district, where Harry E. Rowbottom defeated William E. Wilson, and the Eleventh, where Albert R. Hall defeated Samuel E. Cook, were the two districts going over to the Republicans. Arthur H. Greenwood, Democrat, pulled through by a narrow majority over John E. Sedwick, Republican, in the Second.

G. O. P. in Majority
The General Assembly will be overwhelmingly Republican. Present indications are that the House will be composed of sixty-five Republicans and thirty-five Democrats, and the Senate thirty-one Republicans and nineteen Democrats.

Later returns may show a few changes favorable to the Democrats, but the Republicans are assured of substantial majorities in each branch.

NEGRO ELECTED JUDGE

Wins Chicago Municipal Office on Republican Ticket.

G. O. P. LANDSLIDE CUTS LA FOLLETTE VOTE IN CONGRESS

New Regime Swept Into Power on 'Tide of Coolidge' Wave.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The crushing blow dealt the La Follette progressives throughout the nation will bring into power an entirely new regime in Washington.

But instead of destroying the self-designated "progressive movement" of La Follette, it will only serve to draw its lines more clearly. His groups will endeavor to set themselves up as the opposition "party" to the Administration in the hope that four years from now they will solidly resist the opposition to the Republicans.

The majority held by President Coolidge, however, cannot be seriously challenged.

La Follette even lost his balance of power and his strength was diminished. His right hand man, Senator Brookhart of Iowa, was nearly defeated by his Democratic opponent, Daniel P. Stock, but on late returns held a slight lead.

D. I. Walsh Defeated
In Massachusetts Senator David I. Walsh, Democrat, who is most often listed as a Progressive went down to defeat before Frederick H. Gillette, who so closely coincides with the Coolidge opinion that he is now being talked of as new leader of the Senate. In Minnesota Senator Magnus Johnson, another La Follette adherent, although a farm-laborer, went down to defeat before a Republican.

With the returns practically all in, it seems evident that the new Senate line-up will stand: Republicans, 55; Democrats, 40; Farmer-Labor, 1. Necessary for a majority, 49. This is a gain of four seats for the Democrats and one for the Farmer-Labor group.

Tabulation of the new line-up of the House shows: Republicans, 242; Democrats, 189; others, 4. Necessary for a majority, 218.

This represents actual gain by Coolidge. Republicans of seventeen years ago won the present Congress and a loss by Democrats of eighteen Republican gains were registered in Pennsylvania, where they picked up six seats New Jersey, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, West Virginia and Oregon.

So in the House the Republicans will have a numerical majority of twenty-four votes and a somewhat smaller actual majority when the La Follette Republican strength is deducted.

Longworth for Speaker
Nicholas Longworth of Ohio is expected to succeed Gillette as speaker of the new House if he is elected the post. It is customary for a majority leader to succeed to speakership.

Re publican gains in the Senate were registered in Massachusetts, Colorado, Minnesota, Oklahoma and Kentucky. Outcome in New Mexico, where Senator Bursum, Republican, seems to have been defeated, is still somewhat in doubt.

Scores of new Congressmen will take office and one new Congresswoman—Mrs. Mary T. Norton, Democrat of Jersey City, who says she is going to make an effort to repeal the prohibition law. She is an avowed wet.

MAYORALTY RACE GRIPS ATTENTION IN EARNEST NOW

Spotlight Switched to Forthcoming Primaries Next Year.

The spotlight, focused these many months on the national political arena, was abruptly switched today to the mayoralty race and the battle to be fought in the city primaries in 1925. H. Howard Cahill, said to be backed by the Klan, has already announced as Republican candidate for mayor. Judge Delbert O. Wilmoth has announced he will seek the nomination. From other sources, it is said former Mayor Charles Jewett would like to run again backed by the Jewett-Lemcke faction. With the Dodson-Coffin group firmly in the county and city political saddle as result of Tuesday's election, it is believed William H. Freeman, former county chairman, and a member of the board of works, will not seek the mayor's office. There had been some talk of Freeman before the election.

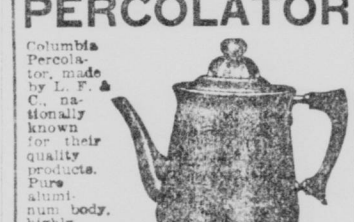

There has also been talk that Jackson K. Landers might seek the office. The name of Adolph Emhardt, member of the school board, is being mentioned in connection with the primary. Dr. M. J. Spencer, member of the board of works, is also prominently mentioned as a likely candidate.
