

GOD ORDERED HER, MURDERESS SAYS

Maid Who Killed Employer
to Be Arraigned.

ELIZABETH, N. J., Nov. 28.—Mary Kumszick, for ten years a stout Polish maid servant, and then, in the twinkling of an eye, a murderer, will be arraigned here to-day.

Crazed with a murderous religious mania, the Polish woman stole from her bed early Thursday and hacked her employer, George H. Davey, to death with an ax as he lay asleep in his home in Plainfield.

Davey's 14-year-old daughter was slashed as she came to her father's aid, but escaped with a deep gash in her face. Mrs. Davey, ill, in an other bed chamber, also was hacked and was in a serious condition in a hospital today.

"The Lord told me to kill them all," Mary said when she finally was overpowered by police.
