

# ALL OVER STATE REPORTED IN GOOD SHAPE

No Serious Breaks Anticipated by Highway Commission.

Reports from all districts show most road surfaces in excellent shape, according to John D. Williams, State highway director today. Highway officials do not anticipate any serious breaks this winter in view of the large volume of work just completed at strengthening secondary types to withstand the rigors of freezes and thaws.

**Road Conditions**  
No. 1 (New Albany, Indianapolis, South Bend, Michigan line)—Pavement from Indianapolis to Peru. Detour seven miles north of Kokomo account of restoring a bridge. South of Indianapolis detour via Chestnut Ridge coming out on State R. No. 1 at seven miles north of Greensburg.  
No. 6 (Madison, Greensburg, Indianapolis, Lafayette, Oxford)—Pavement between New Bethel and Shelbyville with two short detours marked around bridge construction. Northwest of Indianapolis use pavement to three and seven-tenths miles north of Lebanon. Short detour back to pavement. Detour six miles north of Lebanon to west through Thorntown returning to No. 6 at three miles north of Thorntown. Short detour to east four miles north of Thorntown. Admissible to use 44 and 50 or 33 and 32 from Lebanon to Lafayette.  
No. 12 (Vincennes, Spencer, Martinsville, Indianapolis)—Drive slow because of grading new fill at Fish Creek four miles south of Freedom.  
No. 33 (Marion, Paoli, Mitchell, Bedford, Bloomington, Martinsville, Indianapolis)—Pavement between Indianapolis and Martinsville being used by traffic using two detours and two run-arounds. Between Paoli and English is seventeen miles of dirt road which is soft in wet weather. Avoid road south of Grantburg bridge project south of Harrodsburg.  
No. 48 (Indianapolis, Rushville, Brooksville, Cincinnati)—Bridge run-around at foot of Bulltown Hill near Laurel.

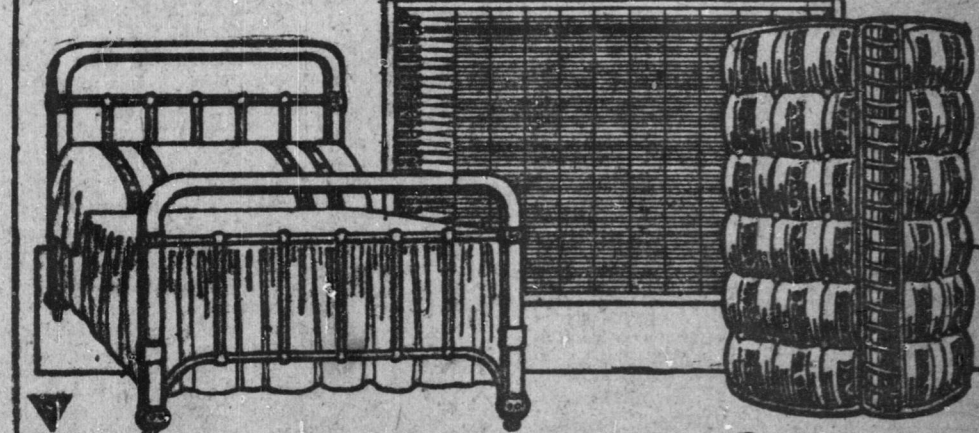
