

BILL ON TEACHING OF BIBLE DRAWN

Churchmen and Education
Back Proposal.

Amendment to the Indiana school law, to provide credit for a maximum of 120 minutes a week of religious education outside of school, today was to be "put into the mill" to become a law by Senator Fred M. Dickerman, Indianapolis, member of Indiana Senate education and public morals committee, who aided in drafting the bill, according to his statement Tuesday night at the Lincoln.

State conference of more than 200 churchmen of all creeds and educators, called by Dr. H. N. Sherwood, State superintendent of public instruction, came to a climax when Dr. W. P. Dearing of Oakland City, president of Indiana State Teachers' Association, moved the proposed bill be backed as representing a "common ground" for all interests.

Bill provides for instruction by some church or church organization, without support by public funds, for children whose parents so desire.

Bill was sure some bad man until he met a modern Delilah with her scissors.

Delilah was the "dame" who shook history in the dark ages by bobbing the hair of Samson.

Bill, who exists only in jazz land, hails from Louisville, and he sure was a wild member of Ernest Hare's to be taken seriously while singing "Big Bad Bill Is Sweet William Now" on an Okeh record.

Bill's favorite toy was a forty-four until he met a "dark skinned Delilah." Then Bill gave up his forty-four and his dice and began to sing soprano in the church quartet.

"Big Bad Bill" is one of those jazz struttin' songs which is rich in modern dialect slang of the hour. This type of jazz song seems to be leading the field just now.

Hare, a baritone, puts over this "Bill" number in good fashion. The orchestration is catchy; in fact, it has a terrific punch. On the other side of this Okeh record is "Gotta Get a Girl," played by the Happiness Boys with a tenor and baritone duet by Billy Jones and Ernest Hare.

I am rather fond of this "girl" number, as it is a haunting little jazz tune with catchy lyrics. The

dust arrangement gives much force to both the sentiment and the melody. Belongs to the more tuneful of the new stuff.
