

## BILL TO REDUCE

## RATE ON SMALL LOANS OFFERED

House Measure Defers Payment on Barrett Law

## Assessments.

A bill reducing the legal loan company rate of interest on loans of \$300 and less from ten to five per cent was introduced today in the Indiana House by Representative Barr, Et. Wayne. The measure, of nine introduced at a short morning session, would forbid advance interest payments.

Payment on Barrett law assessments would be extended sixty days after March 1, each year, in a bill offered by Representative Clark, Elkhart.

A measure introduced by Representative Smith, Indianapolis, authorizes steam and electric railways to use the sidewalks at dangerous crossings on approval of the proper municipal body.

Representative Wright, Lynn, introduced the second chiropractic bill of the session. It would authorize
