BARNETT HAS RECORD

Amateur Operator of Station 9 ACI Gets Mention.

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 22.—It was announced at the American Radio Relay League today that Ralph Barnett of St. Louis, Mo., operator of amateur station 9 ACI, had handled 335 private radio messages during December, which is the best individual record of any amateur operator for that period.

WEAF INCREASES POWER

New York Station Takes Experimental Step.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Station WEAF at New York City has increased its power to 2,000 watts on an experimental basis. This is the first station to use 2,000 watts under the test plan.

For Selectivity

To increase selectivity turn your set into a loop by hooking a 25-turn honeycomb coil between a grounded object and the end of the antenna farther from the house. The circuit is tuned with a variable condenser. The usual ground connection remains.

Value of Good Socket Springs

Socket springs should be of phosphor bronze to make a good, clean contact with the tube. Many sockets have poor grade springs which bend down and stay down when the tube is inserted. This type rarely makes good contact and is the constant source of trouble, due to open circuits.

Causes of Whistling

Whistling is a common fault with tube sets, and is sometimes caused by the lead-in being too close to metal and not properly installed. A wire connecting the frame of the condenser to ground lead will ground condensers.

BROADCAST LISTENERS' ASSOCIATION PLANNED

Indianapolis Needs an Organization of This Kind—
Write The Times Radio Editor.

Last week St. Louis radio fans organized the Radio Society of St. Louis. The purpose of this organization is to aid radio listeners in that city in an effort to stamp out unnecessary interference and for the advancement of radio in the interest of the public. The organization includes well known electrical engineers, prominent St. Louisans and fans who are interested in the science.

This organization plans to do systematic campaigning against radio interference. A committee is being organized to request Mayor Kiel, who is an ardent radio fan, to appoint a radio commission in St. Louis to stamp out interference.

Stop Interference

Chicago and Cleveland both have a radio commission and a broadcast listeners' association which have done a great deal to stop interference. Interference is so great in Indianapolis that it has become a menace to radio reception and if something is not done here along the same lines as is being done in other cities, Indianapolis radio listeners are going to find themselves in a chaos that is going to be hard to emerge from. Local interference is so bad in some parts of Indianapolis at present that it is almost impossible to receive radio programs.

Removal of Tubes Saves Trouble

Before changing the battery connections to a set the bulbs should always be removed. The most careful of radio fans allow short circuits to occur, and even if the connection lasts only an instant, it is usually enough to blow the bulbs out, if the "B" batteries are in the circuit. Ground metal masts used for supporting antenna.

The WD12 tube should not be lighted above a dull red color.

Poor insulation is sometimes cause of poor signal strength.

Some detectors require very critical filament adjustments for best results.

A good pair of telephones is essential for successful operation of a crystal set.

The neck of an old bottle makes a good insulator when running wire through a stick of wood.

When attaching an aerial to a tree, have the wire insulated about 15 feet from the tree to avoid loss.

Many persons so deaf that they cannot hear conversation or enjoy a concert can hear over the radio without difficulty.

Because dust is comprised of metal, the volume of sound in the receiver will be cut down if the inside of the set is permitted to become dirty.

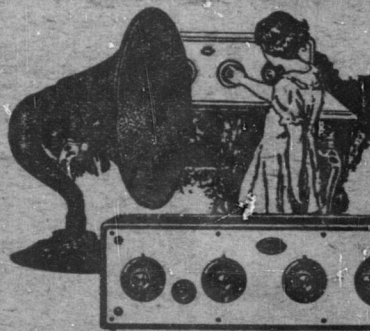
