ANDERSON, Ind., Jan. 22.—Secretary Trester of the Indiana State High School Athletic Association today announced sixty-four sectional centers and eight regional centers for the playing of the 1925 State high school basketball championship. Team entries close Feb. 23. The State finals tourney will be held at Indianapolis March 20 and 21.

Do You Know Basketball?

QUESTIONS
1. Can a player strike the ball with his fist? What happens if a player enters the free-throw line while an opponent is trying for a goal from a free throw?
2. Can a player throw the ball into the courts from out of bounds?

ANSWERS
1. If a player hits the ball with his fist it shall go to an opponent out of bounds at a point nearest where the violation was committed.
2. If the goal is made it shall count. If missed another free throw shall be allowed.

3. He must throw the ball in from out of bounds. If he carries the ball goes to the opponent at the same spot.



TWO MORE MARKS FOR SPEEDY FINN

Crowd Goes Wild When Nurmi Sets Records.

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 22.—Paavo Nurmi, world's champion runner, made his tenth new world's record here Wednesday night when he ran away from two fellow Finns and established new marks for 2 1/4 miles and 2 3/4 miles.

Five thousand spectators saw him win the feature events of the games at the St. Joseph Catholic Club and he was almost mobbed when the new records were announced.

Nurmi started from scratch behind Gunnar Nilson and Uimar Prim, who were given a handicap of 150 yards. Nurmi quickly overtook them and set the pace as he wished. He took a shot at the 2 1/4-mile record, but missed it by 4.5 seconds.

At Coliseum Heretofore
