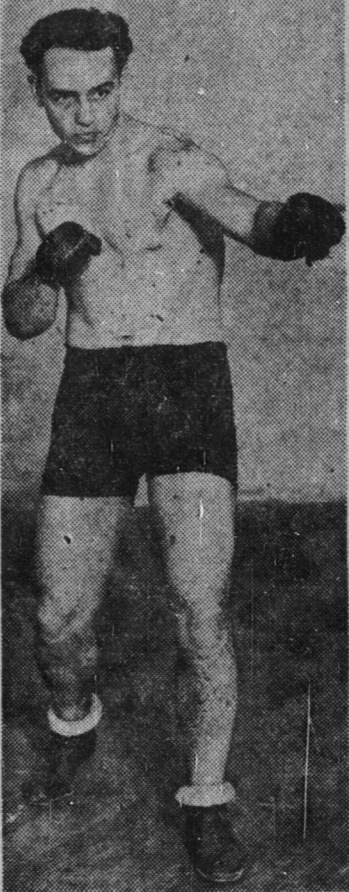

Nurmi Downs America's Best in Fast

"Three-Quarter" Event — Efforts to "Pocket" Finn Fail — Ritola, Frigerio and Osborne Shine.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Charlie Paddock and Loren Murchison ought to take on Paavo Nurmi now and see what they can do with him. The flying Finn has done everything now but beat our American sprinters.

Nurmi turned in the most impressive race of his career Tuesday night when he ran four of America's best middle-distance men "through the track" and won the three-quarter-mile race in the world's record time of 3:33.4. It was the thirteenth world's record he has made since he arrived in this country.

Nurmi trailed Jole Ray, Lloyd Hahn, Jimmy Connolly and Leo Larries until the bell sent the field into the final lap. The Finn then cut loose with a tremendous burst of speed and brought ten thousand spectators to their feet shrieking wildly as he broke the tape ten yards ahead of Ray, who had not been beaten at that distance in five years.

Try Everything
The well-known "works" was tried on Paavo in a desperate attempt for an American victory. The change of pace was tried against the Olympic hero on the theory that he couldn't do his stuff unless he could set his own methodical and perfectly timed pace.

Ray went out like a flash in the lead and his three mates tried to keep Nurmi away from him. They pocketed him and elbowed him on the turns and tried to run him out. But when Nurmi decided to go out, he went out and mowed down the field.

Several other astounding performances marked the first night of the annual Millrose games in Madison Square Garden.

Frigerio Is "There"
Ugo Frigerio, Olympic walking champion, turned a handicap race of three miles into a vaudeville act. The little Italian sped around the track giving Fascisti salute to a crowd that thoroughly enjoyed the comedy. It was a cinch for him.

Willie Ritola, Finnish rival of Nurmi, made his ninth world's record in four days. In the three-mile race, he made a new world's record of 14:04, beating the mark of 14:11.2-5 which he made last Saturday night. He also made new marks for 2 1/4, 2 1/2 and 2 3/4 miles, bettering the five previous marks he had made last Saturday.

Harold Osborne, Olympic and world's champion high jumper, made a new indoor record when he went over the bar at 6 feet and 6 1/4 inches. The former record was 6 feet, 5 1/4 inches, held by Roy Brown and Dick London.

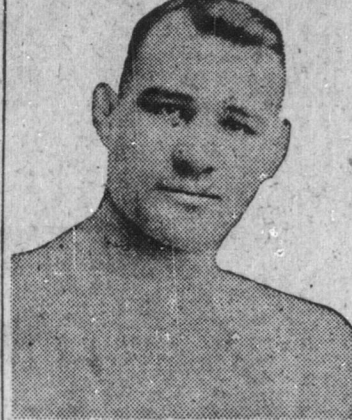
