

ACTION AWAITED ON 'BLUE' BILLS

Public Hearing of Measures
Attended by 200.

The Indiana House Public Morals Committee today was expected to agree on reports for two of the four regulatory bills discussed at a public hearing Wednesday night. Approximately 200 persons attended.

Earl R. Conder, president of the Church Federation of Indianapolis, and the Rev. T. J. Johnson of Ft. Wayne, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, favored the "Blue Sunday" bill, and Sanford B. Horton, field secretary of the Religious Liberty Association; Lewis A. Coleman, one of the owners of Riverside Amusement Park, and Henry L. Dithmer, ice manufacturer, opposed it.
