Mrs. Sarah Richmond, 1217 Charles St., told Lieutenant Thomas she thought a smaller man was with the bandit and stood watch on the outside.

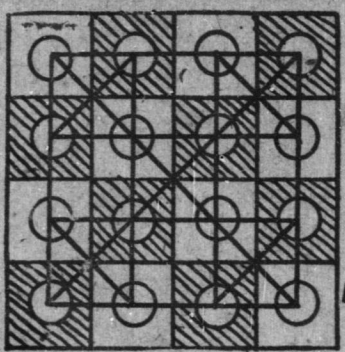
Zoercher Opposes Measure

MORE AGITATION LOOMS IN G. O. P.

Wait Until Council Acts, Say Leaders.

Troubled and turbulent as are the waters of Republican city politics, they are as calm as a mill pond on an August day to what they will be when the city council gets through muddling them up. This was the prediction made today by Republican politicians looking ahead to the day when the council is asked by Ralph Lemcke and George V. Coffin, rival claimants to the city chairmanship, to approve lists of inspectors for the primary election in May.

The law, it was pointed out, gives the council the power to approve inspectors.

Clyde Wall, State chairman, announced Saturday he would recognize Coffin as the head of the regular organization in Indianapolis.

"We can approve the Lemcke inspector list if we want to, and right now we are in the majority in the council," said a councilman favorable to Lemcke.

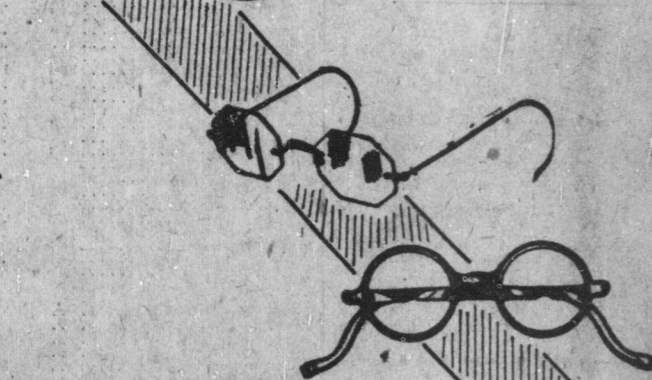
