

LAST WISH DENIED 'DIANA OF DUNES'

Husband Too Poor to Cremate Body of Girl Who Deserted Society to Live in Indiana Wilds.

GARY, Ind., Feb. 11.—"Diana of the Dunes" is to be buried quietly and "narrowly respectable" late today from a little undertaking parlor in the sooty city of Gary. Her last wish—that her body be cremated and the ashes scattered from Mount Tom, in the sandy hills of the dunes she loved, will be unfilled.

"No money," Paul Wilson said today.

Relatives in Charge

"Diana" really Mrs. Alice Gray Wilson, college graduate, who shook off the shackles of conventionality nine years ago and went to live in the shifting sands which border the southern end of Lake Michigan, is to be buried by two relatives, a brother and sister. Wilson admits he is too poor to carry out the wishes of the girl he wedded five years ago. Cremation is expensive. And Paul Wilson's life as a fisherman made it impossible for him to amass much worldly wealth.

STATE TO BUY BUILDING

Highway Commission Negotiates Purchase for \$14,000.

The State highway commission has completed negotiations for purchase for \$14,000 of the two-story brick building at Market and West Sts., owned and occupied by the Western Machine Works. 

Paul Buchanan of Flanner & Buchanan, authorized the Indianapolis Times to transmit to the husband of the late mystery woman of the Hoosier sand dunes an offer of his firm to pay transportation of the husband and "Diana's" body from Gary to Indianapolis for cremation in the Flanner & Buchanan crematory and transportation back to Gary.

"Diana" had expressed the wish that her ashes be scattered to the winds over the dunes, but the husband said he was too poor to pay the cost.

COMPLAINT IS AMENDED

Specific Charges Filed Against Colored Bishop.

An amended complaint making specific charges against defendant bishops discharged by Triumph, the Church and Kingdom of God in Christ was filed in Federal Court today, by Bishop and overseer of the church, a national colored religious organization. Defendants are Bishop John D. Barber, of Youngstown, Ohio, Bishop Cheeless C. Coleman, of Biloxi, Miss., and R. W. Clark, Oakland, Cal.

Denton, Democrat, should have been elected Supreme Court judge over Benjamin M. Willoughby Republican, by 953 votes.
