

## LAST WISH DENIED 'DIANA OF DUNES'

Husband Too Poor to Cremate Body of Girl Who Deserted Society to Live in Indiana Wilds.

GARY, Ind., Feb. 11.—"Diana of the Dunes" is to be buried quietly and "horribly respectable" late today from a little undertaking parlor in the sooty city of Gary. Her last wish—that her body be cremated and the ashes scattered from Mount Tom, in the sandy hills of the dunes she loved, will be unfulfilled.

"No money," Paul Wilson said today.

### Relatives in Charge

"Diana," really Mrs. Alice Gray Wilson, college graduate, who shook off the shackles of conventionality nine years ago and went to live in the shifting sands which border the southern end of Lake Michigan, is to be buried by two relatives, a brother and sister. Wilson admits he is too poor to carry out the wishes of the girl he wedded five years ago. Cremation is expensive. And Paul Wilson's life as a fisherman made it impossible for him to amass much worldly wealth.

### Benefactors

Paul Buchanan of Flanner & Buchanan, authorized The Indianapolis Times to transmit to the husband of the late young woman of the Hoosier sand dunes an offer of his firm to pay transportation of the husband and "Diana's" body from Gary to Indianapolis for cremation in the Flanner & Buchanan crematory and transportation back to Gary.

"Diana" had expressed the wish that her ashes be scattered to the winds over the dunes, but the husband said he was too poor to pay the cost.

### Husband in Seclusion

Wilson remained in seclusion Tuesday. A mile and a half from the nearest road in his shack, sheltered by fire, he mourned alone.

Beside the hut was a half-finished motorboat. In this boat "Diana" and Paul were to have cast loose from their environment in the spring. The dunes were getting too populous. So they had planned to float down the Illinois River to the Mississippi, to the Gulf of Mexico and thence to a distant shore of a river in Texas. In the spring Paul will make the trip alone.

### COMPLAINT IS AMENDED

Specific Charges Filed Against Colored Bishop.

An amended complaint making specific charges against defendant bishops discharged by Triumph, the Church and Kingdom of God in Christ was filed in Federal Court today by Bishop and over-seers of the church, a national colored religious organization. Defendants are Bishop John D. Barber, of Youngstown, Ohio, Bishop Charles C. Coleman, of Bixby, Mich., and R. W. Clark, Oakland, Cal.

The complaint, dismissed Tuesday by Judge Baltzell, charged the bishops after being discharged refused to cease representing the church and failed to turn over money they collected. The bill was filed by Everett D. Hadley, Indianapolis, a member of the Triumph Church, Senate Ave. and Twelfth St.

### URBAHNS TAKES OATH

Last Constitutional Officer Takes Office—Succeeds Davies.

Bernhardt Urbahn, for eight years deputy State treasurer, today took the oath of office as Treasurer of State before Chief Justice Julius A. Travis of the Indiana State Supreme Court. The ceremony took place at 11 a. m. in the Treasurer's office with Statehouse officials and employees present. He is the last constitutional officer elected in the recent election to take office. He succeeds Ora Davies.

### CONTEST RULING ASKED

Legislators Want Gillion's Opinion in Election Suit.

The Denton-Willoughby election contest joint legislation committee today asked Attorney-General Arthur Gillion for a formal opinion as to law and procedure in the case, following a short session Tuesday night.

Another meeting will be held next Tuesday night. The committee is hearing a petition filed by E. C. Day, Kokomo, which alleges George K. Denton, Democrat, should have been elected Supreme Court judge over Benjamin M. Willoughby, Republican, by 933 votes. Willoughby was certified as elected by one vote by the State board of election commissioners.

### STATE TO BUY BUILDING

Highway Commission Negotiates Purchase for \$14,000.

The State highway commission has completed negotiations for purchase for \$14,000 of the two-story brick building at Market and West Sts., owned and occupied by the Western Machine Works. The building, adjoining the State Highway Garage, will be used as a storeroom for parts and supplies, according to John D. Williams, director.

Attorney General Arthur H. Gillion today ruled the commission was empowered to make such purchase. The ground belongs to the State, but was leased by the company about twelve years ago.

### DEFEAT TO BE SOUGHT

Religious Garb Bill, Sent to Engrossment, Faces Battle.

Although the Cooper (Vigo) religious garb bill was passed Congressmen in the House today unopposed, it was reported that strong efforts will be made to defeat the measure in the House when it is headed down for third reading. The measure, prohibiting public school teachers from wearing any distinctive clothing suggestive of religious faith, is similar in nature to the Sims Senate bill, which was defeated.
