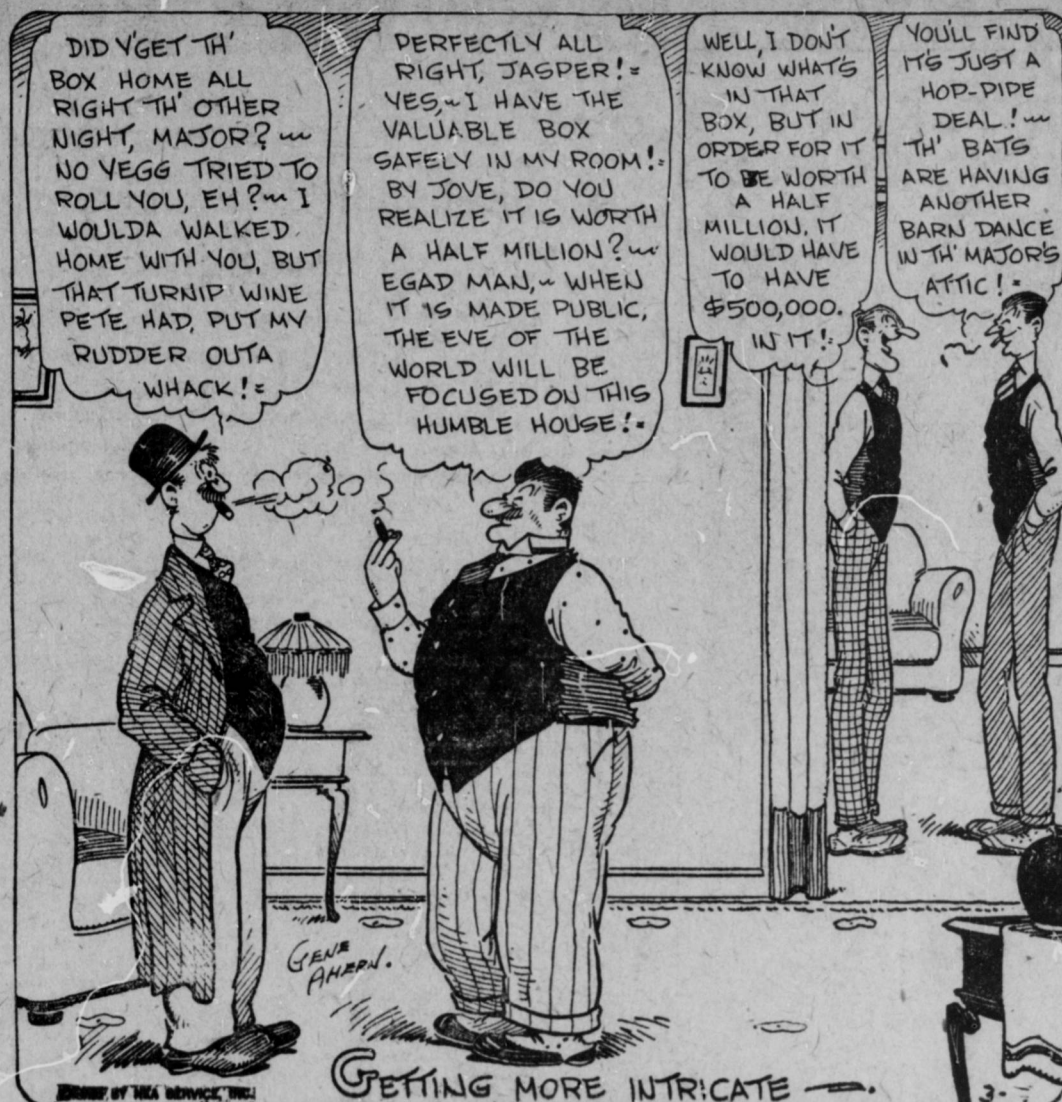

John Edward Switzer, 3, of Bryant was painfully injured when a barn door fell on him while he was playing.

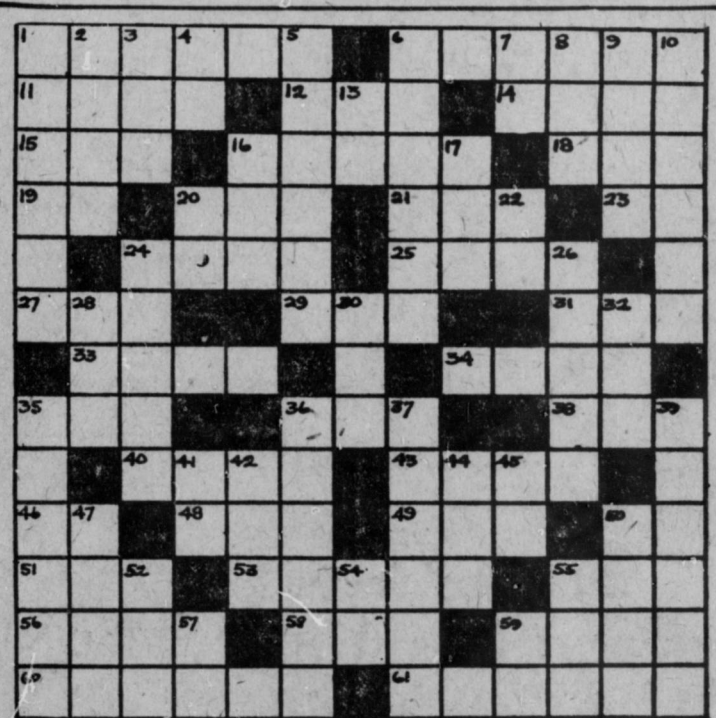
Becky 4, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Maberman, of Wabash, swallowed an open safety pin. She will live.
