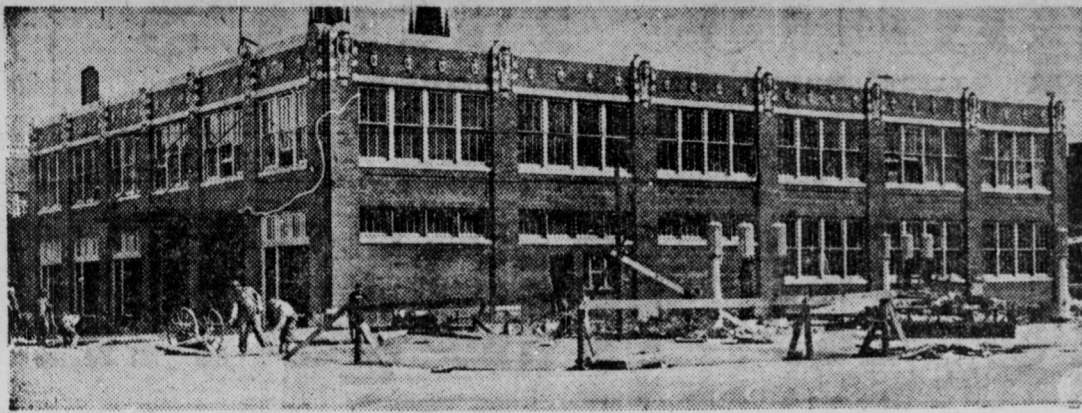

CHAPMAN STILL HAS LOOPHOLE

Government May Demand He Complete Sentence.

HARTFORD, Conn., April 6.—Although Gerald Chapman, mail-bandit, and now a convicted murderer, is sentenced to die June 25, it developed today that he still has a fighting chance for his life.

He may be granted a new trial on appeal or the Federal Government may demand his return to complete a 25-year mail robbery sentence.

Commutation by President Coolidge of his Federal sentence was informally suggested at the Justice Department today as the way in which the Government may solve the problem of whether to surrender Chapman to the Connecticut authorities or to reclaim him to serve out his sentence.
