

## VIOLENT DEATHS IN CHICAGO 21 OVER WEEK-END

Four Murders Recorded—  
Indianapolis Race Driver  
Is Killed.

CHICAGO, June 8.—A total of twenty-one murders, suicides, traffic fatalities and other violent and accidental deaths occurred here over the week-end.

The list includes four murders, three suicides, three deaths due to heat, four traffic deaths, while moonshine, poison, falls and other causes accounted for the rest.

Chicago's perennial bootlegger, Harry C. Hass, was fatally wounded in a gun battle in a cafe. Seven persons were arrested in connection with the affair. An unidentified Italian was killed in a battle of hijackers.

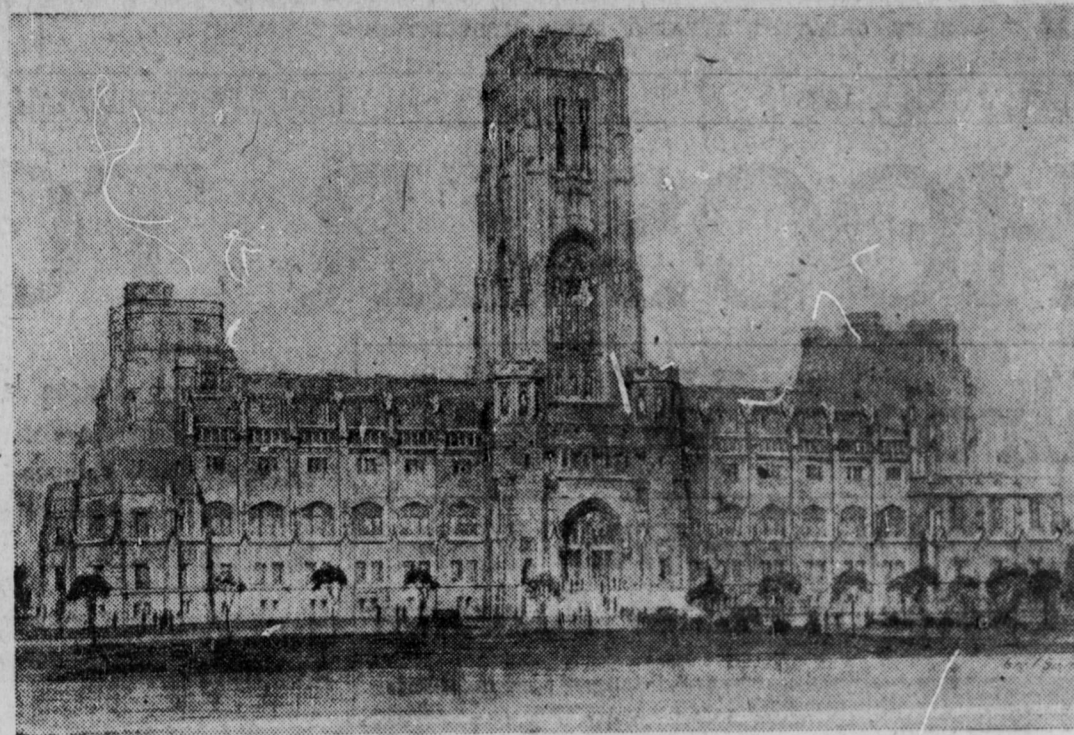
A policeman was fatally wounded by a negro gunman, but the officer shot his assailant to death before succumbing to his wounds.

## PIGEONS RAISED ON FIVE POINTS FARM

The joy that comes from doing work you love is a large part of the satisfaction of owning and operating one of the most up-to-date pigeon farms, according to J. H. LaPearl. His farm, the Five Points Pigeon Farm, is about one block south of the Shelbyville interurban line at the Five Points station. All the farm is laid out in some kind of flower or vegetable garden with a profusion of fruit trees and berry bushes.

LaPearl's pigeons are perfectly housed in light airy coops, and he declares that he cannot keep enough squabs on hand to supply the demand, despite the fact that he has between 600 and 700 birds "at work" all the time. They are White King breed, spotless white with red feet and bright red eyes.

Having devoted much time to the raising of pigeons for the last four years, LaPearl is informed as to the needs and characteristics of the birds. In the last few months he and his wife, who has been a partner in the growing business right along, have added to their establishment the serving of squab dinners to parties of persons from the city.

LaPearl also does an appreciable amount of business selling mated birds, which he guarantees. He is a member of the National Pigeon Association and the American King Club.
