

CONFESION OF 'POISON WIDOW' ISSUE IN TRIAL

Court Battle Looms Over Ad-
mission of Document—
Woman Repudiates It.

CROWN POINT, Ind., July 20.—The confession of Mrs. Anna Cunningham that she poisoned three of her children today furnished the issue of battle in the murder trial of Gary's "poison widow."

Defense attorneys fought to prevent admission of the confession as evidence, while the State attempted to clinch its case with the document.

Repudiates It

Taking the stand just before week-end adjournment, Mrs. Cunningham repudiated every detail of the confession, which was made after her arrest last April.

Mental experts for the State, who examined her, said they found no trace of mental derangement in the woman and that she was thoroughly competent to have made the statement.

Held Sane

To combat this expert testimony, the defense is expected to call other physicians in an attempt to show Mrs. Cunningham was subject to fainting spells and periods of coma. Upon the ruling of Judge Smith on admissibility of the confession depends Mrs. Cunningham's fate.

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

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
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
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
