TWENTY-FOUR LESSONS IN PIANO PLAYING—TWENTIETH LESSON: C MINOR

Lesson No. 20.

This, the twentieth lesson for the piano or organ, according to Grove's home-teaching system, presents the key of C Minor, which is the relative of the key of

E Flat Major. It is the next step in acquiring a sound foundation for a musical education. As requested in the preceding lesson, memorize these chords by playing them over and over until you can play them without looking at the chart.

If you will compare the chords and bass notes of any particular chart in this series with a manuscript of music arranged in the same key this fact will appear: Two-thirds or even more of the chords of harmony in the manuscript, except those used for mod-

ulation, are comprised in some position of the chords arranged in these charts. That is, the chords most in use are those that you have already learned in previous lessons. The chords of modulation are those that permit a change from one key to another by easy steps.

When you are playing accompaniments each chord you strike should (in general) contain the note of the melody that is sounded with the chord. You can study this out from the charts, but few persons should

need more instruction on this point than the ear itself can give.

Persistence is necessary if you are to learn much from these lessons. You must play the chords over and over, first with the chart placed on the instrument before you so that the white spaces are over the white keys and black spaces are over the black keys and then without the use of the chart. Commit to memory also the names of the keys that make up the different chords. This should give you sufficient knowledge

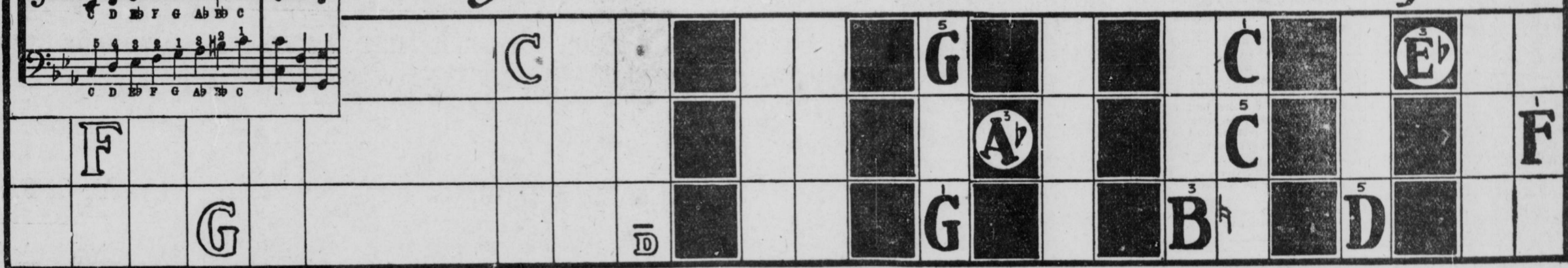
for playing accompaniments. If you wish to go further in the study of the piano or organ, learn the fingering of the scales shown in the upper left hand corner of each chart.

Every triad in black letter is marked 1, 2, 3. Always read it so, no matter in what vertical order the notes may be written. Note that the small letter D with a dash above it must not be played.

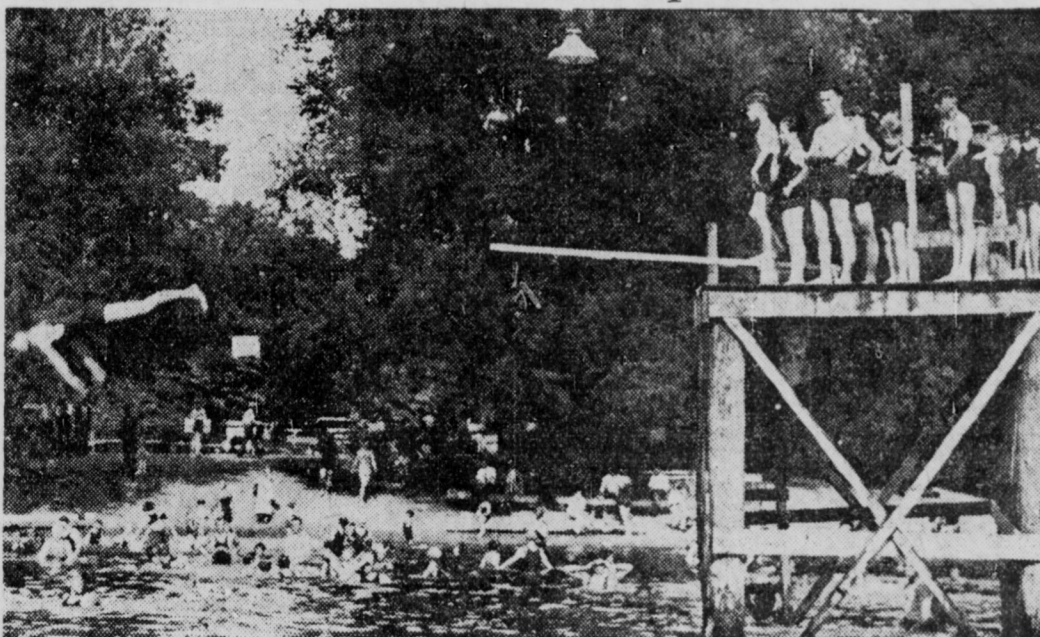

Motor Mounts 'Buck' With Inspectors

Not Much Economy, Say City Officials After Accidents.

If you would split the winds on a motorcycle, they learn thoroughly the eccentricities of the mounts. Two of the six board of health inspectors learned this lesson Tuesday, the first day of motorization of the board health field force, reduced from twenty to six inspectors for economy.

Losing control of his throbbing steed, J. A. Theaman crashed into a flier at Broadway and Twenty-First Sts., narrowly avoiding running down two children on the sidewalk and ended his ride with severe bruises, slashed trousers and a smashed motorcycle.

A. L. McGivern also took a tumble and suffered minor bruises.

Thompson Critiques
Severe criticism of the board's policy in sending untrained motorcycle riders on the streets was voiced by Ben H. Thompson, city council president, who arrived on the scene soon after the accident on Broadway.

"It's dangerous to public safety to allow any untrained rider to drive a motorcycle," he said. "Besides, think of the ruined motorcycles."

Hogue Unsympathetic
"There's not much economy there," commented Joseph L. Hogue, city controller, who has been unsympathetic with the board's dismissal of inspectors.

Inspectors who never before had ridden a motorcycle are said to have volunteered to tackle the temperamental mounts to save their jobs.
